## Step Eight- “Made A List of All Persons We Had Harmed, and Became Willing to Make Amends to Them All”

“Since defective relations with other human beings have nearly always been the immediate cause of our woes, including our alcoholism, no field of investigation could yield more satisfying and valuable rewards than this one.” This statement from the “Twelve and Twelve” is a poignant one since few places in our literature speak of an explicit cause of alcoholism.

Many years ago, when still drinking, I stood at my father's coffin and whispered to him, “If you had given me what I needed when you were alive, I might be able to feel something now. But I have nothing to give.” I believed at the time that my father had never loved me, and I regretted this, but it never occurred to me that I was still free to love him and that I was failing this responsibility.

For a long time, the one regret I had in sobriety was that I hadn't been aware of my responsibility to love and had not been able to express love for my father. Throughout my life it seems as though I'd been squeezing the world by the throat trying to make it love me, not realizing I first had to become a loving person in order to attract love into my life.

In my early sobriety, I saw an image on the bulletin board at a local rehab of a bottle of booze, complete with skull and crossbones, under which a caption read: “It's ironic that you should have embraced me when you were seeking love, for I have not one drop of compassion for you.” I was sober a few years when it occurred to me that I had never embraced my sons, who were man-sized by then. My wife helped me through this awkwardness by suggesting we should have a “family hug night” one night a week. My sons and I admitted feeling a bit awkward the first time we embraced, but afterward we all agreed that we felt liberated. We no longer experience awkwardness when embracing each other. We feel only love. Love is the way.

My father's name was on my Eighth Step list, and about a year and a half after I'd made the list, he came to me in a dream. In the dream, I asked his forgiveness because I was not the son I might have been or could have been because of my alcoholism. My father forgave me. Perhaps a dream therapist or a psychiatrist or some other scientifically-minded person might be able to tell me what this meant. But actually I don't care what anyone thinks about it. I know the relationship with my father has been healed. We are reminded in the St. Francis Prayer that it is better to love than to be loved, and Edmund Spenser poetically suggests, “Gather the rose of love whilst yet is time.”



## **Tradition 8: “Alcoholics Anonymous should remain forever non-professional, but our service centers may employ special workers.”**

In the long form of this tradition the Twelve and Twelve goes on to state that these are for purposes for which we might have to hire non-alcoholics and that these services need to be paid for, in keeping with our Seventh Tradition, but that our 12 step work is never paid for.

In the opinion of most people alcoholics are best suited for these tasks as they know the AA lingo and understand the program of Alcoholics Anonymous.

In *The Language of the Heart* it states, “Tradition Eight forswears professionalizing out Twelve Step work but it does guarantee our few paid service workers an unquestioned amateur status.”

Our paid workers do not perform Twelve Step work, but they do enhance and make our Twelve Step work possible, and they perform thankless tasks that no one else wants to do. Also, many of these tasks volunteers would not be able to perform every day.

In our Intergroup/Central Offices we need paid workers to order conference approved books, pamphlets and literature, and to keep our shelves stocked with these items, so that when Twelve Stepping newcomers these items are available to be sure we are carrying the AA Message. In some Intergroup/Central Offices Non-Conference material is also sold and we need to be sure that there is a clear distinction between these items. We also need to remember that related material while called Non-Conference approved does not mean disapproved.

Usually a “hot line” is available 24/7 so that no call for help goes unanswered, and a schedule needs to be set up and maintained so that an AA member is always available to help the still suffering alcoholic who reaches out for help. Our Special Workers are the ones who perform this task so that Twelve Step work is possible to the members of Alcoholics Anonymous.

Also, without our Special Workers how would we as members of Alcoholics Anonymous know where our meetings were held, when and at what time? Our Special Workers put together a meeting directory so that we have the meeting information available. This directory also lets us know which meetings are open and which are closed, and the type of meeting. This is important as we don't want to send non-alcoholics to a closed meeting. Also, many times members are looking for a special type of meeting and this information is also available. Some offices have this meeting directory online so that as meetings change the information online is always current to be sure we don't send a newcomer to a meeting that is no longer in existence.

Twelve Step work is spiritual in nature, the AA message is free, and we give it away in gratitude for our own recovery. That is why in our Intergroup/Central Offices the paid workers perform the business tasks and volunteers handle the Twelve Step calls that come into the offices.

In the Twelve and Twelve Tradition Five begins, “Shoemaker stick to thy last” and this also applies to this Tradition; let the paid workers perform the non Twelve Step tasks and let the members of Alcoholics Anonymous carry the message of recovery.

## **From the Archives:** :The Alcoholic Foundation

In 1938, Bill W and others still pictured AA going into business, opening up hospitals and helping many alcoholics to recover, while recovering from poverty themselves. They needed investors to get all of that started, or, better, donors, but they had no way to handle the flood of money that they hoped would pour in. With that need they believed they had, they started the Alcoholic Foundation, whose members got together on August 11th, ready to shepherd the money into this new treatment for alcoholism. There were five members: three alcoholics and two alcoholics, one of them Dr Bob. Bill W didn't co-head this foundation, but did sit on the advisory board that would help these new trustees with all of this expected money. And, like so many other times in our history, it's a blessing that things didn't go as planned.

After the Rockefeller dinner, where some of the wealthiest Americans were encouraged not to give money to AA, the foundation that was ready for that flood of funds got as little as a trickle instead. It wasn't just that these wealthy people wouldn't donate; maybe not many people wanted to send money to a group of alcoholics who were trying to keep each other sober, no matter how big their dreams for the future were. The book "Alcoholics Anonymous," also a hoped for magnet for donors, wasn't getting much interest, or many investors, either, as it was getting written. What good could this Alcoholic Foundation do AA?

We can see the answer today, in our General Service Board, which the Alcoholic Foundation became. Its twenty one trustees, fourteen alcoholic and seven nonalcoholic, oversee AA services worldwide--no hospitals, no big advertising, just simple access to our basic program. They help with the foundation that really matters: the one made of spiritual principles that anchors millions of sober lives ("A.A. Comes of Age")....

## Central Committee Minutes- 7/12/15

Pat brought a motion to accept the minutes from last month, Sue M. seconded. Minutes were accepted by the committee

**Envelope System** (Sue, Chairperson) We received \$655 in donations this month. We had thirteen individual donors, consisting of two large quarterly donations, 7 monthly credit card donors, and four monthly donors. There were no new donors.

When the credit card option was brought to the committee, there was a positive response for use due to the convenience for making purchases and even donating on a monthly basis. To date only 7 people have chosen to use this option for donating through the envelope system. For \$10 dollars a month, we will help keep the office running smoothly and helping provide needed services such as sending committee members to workshops, providing literature in treatment facilities, and the prisons. **Steering Committee** (Debi, Zone 3) Conducted Terry's annual review was mostly A's and B's. Will present a salary recommendation within new business. Have openings in 1, 4, and 7; Pete W. (Journey Group) stood for zone 1; due to a lack of representation from Zone 1, he was appointed. Holly (Orchard Park Step) stood for Zone 4 there Joanne (Action) and Steve (Orchard Park Step) voted to appoint her.

**Financial** (Chip, Lighten Up) **June 2015: Total Income:** \$8,561. Literature sales were \$3,739. Group contributions were \$3,737. **Total Expenses:** \$8,410. The notable large hit was the \$1,150 for the accounting work. **Monthly Net:** Positive \$151. The year to date is a negative \$6,398. **Checking Account:** balance is \$23,570.64. **Petty Cash:** balance is \$3,000. **Prudent Reserve:** balance is up with interest at \$28,134.80. **Inventory:** balance is \$12,327.52. Product purchases for the month were \$1,227. **Corrections Committee:** Current Balance is \$1,348.85. Contributions were \$265 and expenses were \$611. **Treatment Committee:** Current Balance is \$1,524.60. 
