Our membership changes every year. People join and leave the fellowship. We keep no records. Because of our ever-increasing membership, we need service centers to carry the message, and service people to man them.



## **SEX IN SOBRIETY**

"We treat sex as we would any other problem." Alcoholics Anonymous Pg. 69

The Big Book is very careful to be sensitive to this topic. This is not a subject to be treated lightly, for we all have varying degrees of problems in this area. We must be careful when sharing about sex in a meeting. There are a few 13<sup>th</sup> steppers who might take advantage of the vulnerable nature that this topic tends to bring out in people. We are not all as well as we make you think.

The Book talks about how we turn lust into love. I've done it a few times myself. Over the years it has gotten easier to detect and deflect; however, early on I was so enraptured with the thought of "Him" I couldn't see the forest for the trees. I remember when "He" first captured my heart and after 2 weeks I was convinced "He" was the "One." 'We will live happily ever after' I'd say and think over and over again. A week later I couldn't figure out what I saw in "Him" as I sleazed into another relationship.

In today's time I might have been called a "bunny boiler." Back then, however, in the early days of sobriety, we called it "Love." Sound familiar? Your heart races when you see "Him" and every minute away from "Him" leaves you obsessing on when you'll get to see "Him" next, what you'll say, wear or do.

We plot and plan the next calculated move every step of the way when we are emotionally stunted. How appropriate that Bill W., Bob S. and the first hundred members thought like we do. Intentional or not, Flip from page 69 to the top of page 96 and you'll have the pages of the Big Book you need to address these problems.

Sex in sobriety is something that has to be dealt with, especially when the end goal is spirituality. Sponsors can help bridge the gap that most people find when trying to deal with the subject. Talk to your sponsor and you might be surprised to find out that what you're so embarrassed to reveal was on your sponsor's fourth step as well.

## **HUMILITY vs. HUMILIATE**

The right actions must be consistent in all areas of our lives: AA, work, home and in the community.

We need to remind ourselves that our thinking is for entertainment purposes only. My life is so much better today not having to always make amends and knowing that I am welcomed back. It's called being a mature adult.

Dave K. was a frequent participant at the UMDG. At a discussion table one day, I was



sharing some of the war stories about my new boss. Dave, chewing on his ever present cigar, growled out something like this, "Just because we get sober in AA doesn't mean we will be spared some SOB who comes into our life to make it miserable, just hang in there until he goes away!" He called the shot, I did hang in. Shortly after that, my "Hot shot" boss was

fired and my employment was blessed with a number of success stories.

Charlie G. affectionately nick-named "Charlie The Baker", passed away in the 1980's with 25 years of sobriety. Charlie and I went to meetings every week. One night, while we were driving some others home from a meeting, we passed the "House of Quinn." One of the guy s mentioned that the House of Quinn was scheduled for demolition, as part of some urban renewal project. Charlie responded with "my, how tragic—thousands will be left homeless." Just a sample of Charlie's Irish humor. Rest in peace Charlie.
