Made a List ...

The list that some of us had to make in applying the 8th Step would compare in length to current real estate lists of house and apartment applicants. The length of the list of people we had harmed grew with the degree of our honesty and the accuracy of our memory.

Perhaps some people do come into A.A. with a fortunate record of having harmed only a few. We doubt, however, that anyone need turn in a blank piece of paper—not if he thinks long enough and honestly enough. What, for instance, of the business associates who took on some of our work during our absence from the office or on those days of the shakes and low efficiency? What of the friends whose time we wasted with such very boring blabber? And, too, there are those intangible but damaging effects of the example we set for others; the good we might have done but didn't; the contributions we could have made to helping some one else in some way, or just making a moment or two more pleasant—but didn't; the success of someone else we might have boosted along, but didn't.

Anyone except a saint will find that he has harmed someone, somewhere, and that he has harmed society and his fellow men by failing to do the things for which he had the time, the talent and the opportunity, but not the sense of responsibility.

Even the rare quiet and so-called well-behaved alcoholic can make a list. And the ordinary variety of drunks, which the great majority of us are, can usually make a list from here to Timbuktu, beginning with the wife, the youngsters, the relatives and the boss, and extending on through the people we borrowed from and didn't pay back, the people we lied to—and so on and on and on.

The challenge of making amends is indeed a formidable matter to contemplate. In some instances, even to make amends to some one person, such as a particularly hated enemy, seems more than anyone can undertake.

But this process of self-inventory and self-cauterizing also offers one of the most restorative experiences to be found through A.A. The experience begins to unfold, too, while making the list of people we have harmed and becoming "willing to make amends to them all".

Let us note that wording—"became willing to make amends". We may not be able to make amends to everyone we have harmed. Circumstances may prevent us from making amends to all, and there may be reasons why we should not undertake to make amends to some—as suggested in the 9th Step. But there is nothing at all to prevent us or to restrain us from becoming willing to make amends.

The point here is that in order to become willing to make amends we have to admit to ourselves without reservations and without quibbling or

reciting reasons why we did it, that we did commit the harm. We have to attain the attitude in which we say to ourselves that whether or not the other person was

Just a thought ...

Have you ever taken a look at "The Promises" (pp. 83-84 in the Big Book) from the perspective of how they "came true" for you when you were drinking?

- If we are painstaking about this phase of our development, we will be amazed before we are half way through. (from that first drink ~ finally feeling able to "fit in", be more relaxed and outgoing around people)
- We are going to know a new freedom and a new happiness. (drinking to become numb and forget the troubles of the day)
- We will not regret the past nor wish to shut the door on it. (it was all funny, with great "drunk-a-logs")
- We will comprehend the word serenity and we will know peace. (filling the "whole" with booze and washing down our problems)
- No matter how far down the scale we have gone, we will see how our experience can benefit others. (becoming the "life of the party", free entertainment for others)
- That feeling of uselessness and self-pity will disappear. (false happiness)
- We will lose interest in selfish things and gain interest in our fellows. (suddenly outgoing and becoming whoever others want us to be)
- Self-seeking will slip away. (feeling care-free and "a part of")
- Our whole attitude and outlook upon life will change. (no more worries)
- Fear of people and of economic security will leave us. (becoming invincible, "drinks for everyone" with \$ suddenly no object)
- We will intuitively know how to handle situations which used to baffle us. (uninhibited)
- We will suddenly realize that God is doing for us what we could not do for ourselves. (***all except this last promise seemed to "work" ~ this one mentions GOD, and I was truly running on my self-will vs. His when I was out there ~ however, He was always there (obviously) or I would have been dead a long time ago!)

Then, at some point, the switch was flipped! And the drink no longer made these promises come true. It just didn't work for me anymore, no matter how hard I tried. When I drank, I isolated, felt alone, was miserable, depressed, anxious, fearful, restless, irritable, discontent, paranoid, etc. I didn't want to drink, but had to drink ... I was afraid to drink, yet afraid not to drink ... I wanted to die!

Now, far enough away from the drink, I can see "The Promises" really coming true in my life one day at a time! This is something I never thought possible for me; however it is truly an experience beyond my wildest dreams! If you are new and this has not happened for you "yet", just keep coming. "You're eligible too!"

Are these extravagant promises? We think not. They are being fulfilled among us ~ sometimes quickly, sometimes slowly. They will always materialize if we work for them.





This Month in A.A. ~ Bob D.

One hundred and thirty-three years ago this month Dr. Bob, one of the co-founders of Alcoholics Anonymous, was born in St. Johnsbury, Vermont. Sixty years later he and Sister Ignatius admitted the first of more than 5,000 drunks they would treat at St. Thomas Hospital in Akron, Ohio.

In honor of Dr. Bob's birthday—and because it's been a busy few weeks for your archives correspondent—this month's installment is excerpted from the last significant talk he gave in A.A., in Detroit in December of 1948. The speech was transcribed and printed by the A.A. Grapevine in June of 1973. Anyone interested in reading his entire talk surely can locate it online, as I did.

What's most striking is that the principles set forth at the beginning of the fellowship rang true post-World War II, and are just as relevant today.

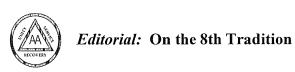
"I don't think we can do anything very well in this world unless we practice it. And I don't believe we do A.A. too well unless we practice it. The fellows who win great world awards in athletic events are people who practice, have been practicing for years, and still have to practice. To do a good job in A.A., there are a number of things we should practice. We should practice, as I've said, acquiring the spirit of service. We should attempt to acquire some faith, which isn't easily done, especially for the person who has always been very materialistic, following the standards of society today. But I think faith can be acquired; it can be acquired slowly; it has to be cultivated. That was not easy for me, and I assume that it is difficult for everyone else.

"Another thing that was difficult for me (and I probably don't do it too well yet) was the matter of tolerance. We are all inclined to have closed minds, pretty tightly closed. That's one reason why some people find our spiritual teaching difficult. They don't want to find out too much about it, for various personal reasons, like the fear of being considered effeminate. But it's quite important that we do acquire tolerance toward the other fellow's ideas. I think I have more of it than I did have, although not enough yet. If somebody crosses me, I'm apt to make a rather caustic remark. I've done that many times, much to my regret. And then, later on, I find that the man knew much more about it than I did. I'd have been infinitely better off if I'd just kept my big mouth shut.

"Another thing with which most of us are not too blessed is the feeling of humility. I don't mean the fake humility of Dickens' Uriah Heep. I don't mean the doormat variety; we are not called upon to be shoved around and stepped on by anyone; we have a right to stand up for our rights. I'm talking about the attitude of each and every one of us toward our Heavenly Father. Christ said, 'Of Myself, I am nothing—My strength cometh from My Father in heaven.' If He had to say that, how about you and me? Did you say it? Did I say it? No. That's exactly what we didn't say. We were inclined to say instead, 'Look me over, boys. Pretty good, huh?' We had no humility, no sense of having received anything through the grace of our Heavenly Father.

"I don't believe I have any right to get cocky about getting sober. It's only through God's grace that I did it. I can feel very thankful that I was privileged to do it. I may have contributed some activity to help, but basically, it was only through His kindness. If my strength does come from Him, who am I to get cocky about it? I should have a very, very humble attitude toward the source of my strength; I should never cease to be grateful for whatever blessings come my way. And I have been blessed in very large measure.

"You know, as far as everybody's ultimate aim is concerned, it doesn't make much difference whether we're drinking or whether we're sober. Either way, we're all after the same thing, and that's happiness. We want peace of mind. The trouble with us alcoholics was this: We demanded that the world give us happiness and



"Alcoholics Anonymous should remain forever non-professional. We define professionalism as the occupation of counseling alcoholics for fees or hire. But we may employ alcoholics where they are going to perform those services for which we might otherwise have to engage non-alcoholics. Such special services may be well recompensed. But our usual A.A. '12th Step' work is never to be paid for."

Throughout the world A.A.s are "12th stepping" with thousands of new prospects a month. Between one and two thousand of these stick on our first presentation; past experience shows that most of the remainder will come back to us later on. Almost entirely unorganized, and completely non-professional, this mighty spiritual current is now flowing from alcoholics who are well to those who are sick. One alcoholic talking to another; that's all.

Could this vast and vital face-to-face effort ever be professionalized or even organized? Most emphatically, it could not. The few efforts to professionalize straight "12th Step" work have always failed quickly. Today, no A.A. will tolerate the idea of paid "A.A. Therapists" or "organizers". Nor does any A.A. like to be told just how he must handle that new prospect of his. No, this great life-giving stream can never be dammed up by paid do-gooders or professionals. Alcoholics Anonymous is never going to cut its own life lines. To a man, we are sure of that.

But what about those who serve us full time in other capacities—are cooks, caretakers and paid Intergroup secretaries "A.A. professionals"?

Because our thinking about these people is still unclear, we often feel and act as though they were such. The impression of professionalism subtly attaches to them, so we frequently hear they are "making money out of A.A.", or that they are "professionalizing" A.A. Seemingly, if they do take our A.A. dollars they don't quite belong with us A.A.s any more. We sometimes go further; we underpay them on the theory they ought to be glad to "cook" for A.A. cheap.

Now isn't this carrying our fears of professionalism rather far? If these fears ever got too strong, none but a saint or an incompetent could work for Alcoholics Anonymous. Our supply of saints being quite small, we would certainly wind up with less competent workers than we need.

We are beginning to see that our few paid workers are performing only those service tasks that our volunteers cannot consistently handle. Primarily these folks are not doing 12th Step work. They are just making more and better 12th Step work possible. Secretaries at their desks are valuable points of contact, information and public relations. That is what they are paid for, and nothing else. They help carry the good news of A.A. to the outside world and bring our prospects face to face with us. That's not "A.A. therapy"; it's just a lot of very necessary but often thankless work.

So, where needed, let's revise our attitude toward those who labor at our special services. Let us treat them as A.A. associates, and not as hired help; let's recompense them fairly and, above all, let's absolve them from the label of professionalism.

Let us also distinguish clearly between "organizing the A.A. movement" and setting up, in a reasonably business-like manner, its few essential services of contact and propagation. Once we do that, all will be well. The million or so brother alcoholics who are still sick will then continue to get the break we 60,000 A.A.s have already had.

Let's give our "service desks" the hand they so well deserve.

peace of mind in just the particular way we wanted to get it—by the alcohol route. And we weren't successful. But when we take time to find out some of the spiritual laws, and familiarize ourselves with them, and put them into practice, then we do get happiness and peace of mind. I feel extremely fortunate and thankful that our Heavenly Father has let me enjoy them. Anyone can get them who wishes to. There seem to be some rules that we have to follow, but happiness and peace of mind are always here, open and free to anyone. And that is the message we can give to our fellow alcoholics.

"We know what A.A. has done in the past 13 years, but where do we go from here? Our membership at present is, I believe, conservatively estimated at 70,000. Will it increase from here on? Well, that will depend on every member of A.A. It is possible for us to grow or not to grow, as we elect. If we fight shy of entangling alliances, if we avoid getting messed up with controversial issues (religious or political or wet-dry), if we maintain unity through our central offices, if we preserve the simplicity of our program, if we remember that our job is to get sober and to stay sober and to help our less fortunate brother to do the same thing, then we shall continue to grow and thrive and prosper."

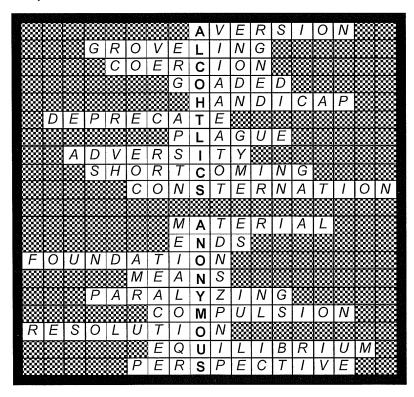

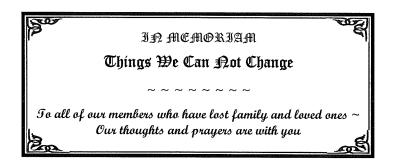

wrong or right, we were wrong. Maybe the person we harmed was a louse. That doesn't make our brand of lousiness any better. It's no excuse. The louse we harmed must go on the list along with the good people we've harmed.

Reaching the degree of self-analysis and honesty which carries us to a willingness to make amends to all helps to set the stage for the beginning of real progress in A.A., or real progress in any way of life. This is part of the conditioning process for attaining honesty and humility and helpfulness; part of the process of fitting ourselves again into society; a very vital step in the rehabilitation of the alcoholic.

We know that when drinking we are selfish, self-centered, egotistical and self-dramatists. We are filled with self-pity over the great wrongs everyone has done us, how we are misunderstood, how thoughtless others are towards us.

The 8th Step is an excellent purgative for the kind of thinking, as well as acting, that we've been doing. Drink long and deeply of this Step, because while it may taste very bad going down, the effects are miraculous.

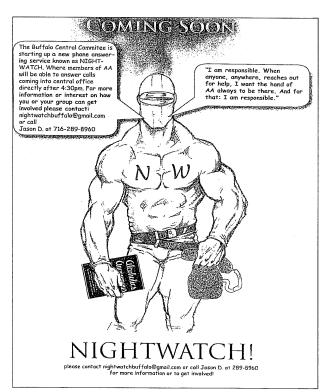
