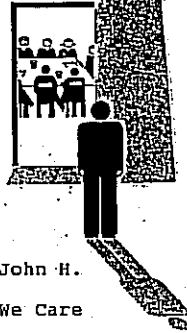

### 1995 - A Fresh Start

We Care

Let's first review the year 1994 in terms of financial support for the Central Office and all the Committees in dire need of funds. As a representative to the Central Committee, I am appalled, disappointed and disgusted with the year-end report of the donations to the Central Office, the Treatment and Corrections Facilities Committees and GSO from the various groups in the Western New York area. Try to digest these figures!

**There are 294 certified groups of AA in WNY.  
A breakdown of the donations for 1994:**

- 134 groups or 45% donated nothing, zero, nada!
- 41 groups or 15% donated from \$1.00 to \$50.00
- 48 groups or 16% donated from \$51.00 to \$119.00
- 71 groups or 24% donated \$120.00 and up.

A Large part of the 71 groups donated much more than \$120.00, some with high 3 digit donations and high 4 digit accumulative figures for the year. They are the true life blood of AA, keeping the Central Office alive. These groups are to be applauded for their efforts and donations. They fill my heart with admiration for keeping AA solvent and carrying the message of gratitude.

I realize that some small groups do not have the prudent reserve in their treasury that other large groups have, but none the less, baskets are still passed at every meeting and some money is collected.

Now suppose, just suppose that each of the 294 groups donated \$10.00, that's right, only \$10.00 per month to the Central Office. At the end of 1995, the Central Office coffers will be enriched by \$35,280.00. Astounding, isn't it?

The Central Office, the very Heart of AA in our area, is begging for support! If that office were to close down, who would answer those 500 to 600 calls a month from the still sick and suffering alcoholic, the Twelve Step calls, the Alateen, Alanon and ACOA calls? Who would direct those out-of-town visitors to an AA meeting?

Our Fourth tradition states that "Each group should be autonomous except in matters affecting other groups or AA as a whole." Doesn't financial support of the Central Office and its various committees affect AA as a whole? On this issue, our common welfare is paramount.

The Big Book, p.563: "To those now in its fold, Alcoholics Anonymous has made the difference between misery and sobriety, and often the difference between life and death. AA can, of course, mean just as much to uncounted alcoholics not yet reached.

"Therefore, no society of men and women had a more urgent NEED for continuous effectiveness and permanent unity. We alcoholics see that we must work together and hang together else most of us will finally die alone."

While it is understandable that social events have their place in AA, aren't we suffering from a bout of overkill in that respect? Dances, picnics, barbecues, and, yes, even a Prom, featuring the magic sounds of "Manny Music and His Magnificent Sounds of Love." Give me a break! Where does the ticket price for admission and 50/50 raffles go? (into the treasury to sit there for the next event?) And what's next, a 900 number with hot talk to perk up the spirits of lonely alcoholics?

Let's briefly discuss the baskets being passed at meetings. To some AAs you'd think there was a cobra inside. It's just swiftly passed along. Are we all unemployed or indigent? Aren't we self-supporting through our own contributions? We can certainly find the money for 50/50 or some social event!

At some groups, the mere announcement of a business meeting after the regular meeting sends shivers up the spines of certain members. Yipes! It might be job assignment night. Their hasty exit resembles a Chinese fire drill! What a shameful exhibition of gratitude for their gift of sobriety.

In conclusion, a short message to the treasurers of AA groups: at your next business meeting, why don't you entertain a motion to send a donation to the Central Office. If you are one of the groups who do make donation, why not increase by 10%? Recognize the financial needs of the Central Office and its committees and act on it!

Let's get back to basics and our primary purpose. There are thousands of alcoholics in need of our experience, strength and hope. Let's not abandon or ignore them!

Make 1995 a banner year for OUR Central Office. For, in helping the still sick and suffering alcoholics, are we not really helping ourselves?

Take a moment to reflect on your gift of sobriety. Has your gratitude and service been put on the back burner? Let's get out of self and into the program of Alcoholics Anonymous as it was intended.

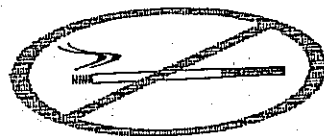

There's nobody under 34 yrs. of sobriety participating. In my travel with the teachings of my sponsor, I learned the wisdom of the program comes from Oldtimers, who are so often forgotten, because they can't make meetings due to their physical condition. With a few phonecalls these people were more than happy to share their experience, strength and hope.

The greatest problem regarding this event was securing a handicap accessible location to put on Old Timers Day. This will not be financed by any group, Central Office or GSO. We will cover costs by lunch, passing the basket, 50/50 and sales of tapes of the conference.

This is the traditional way of AA. The sole purpose of this event is to spread the message of recovery that's in our Big Book of Alcoholics Anonymous. Twelve people are going to share what it was like back then, what they had to go through to get here and how they maintained their sobriety through the tragedies of life. Each panelist has half an hour, except for Mabel, the oldest member of AA in WNY, who will share her lead for 45-50 minutes.

I just finished reading the article "Freedom in the Heart" written by Ron S. in the December issue of the "New Frontiers." In that article he spoke of the rewards he has received from sharing his experience, strength and hope through service work, particularly his involvement with the Correctional Facility Meeting.

A tear ran down my cheek as I read this article. I could feel the love and gratitude Ron has for this type of service. One of the reasons this article touched me is because I'm writing this letter from inside my cell at Cayuga Correctional Facility where I am serving a 5-10 year sentence as a direct result of my drinking. But that isn't the only reason his article moved me as it did. It also made me realize the importance that my fiancé and her parents, (all three are members of the fellowship), my sponsor and other friends in Buffalo continue to have in my recovery. If it were not for their love and willingness to carry the AA message, as Ron is doing at Wende Correctional Facility, I may have ended my life. They gave me hope when I felt hopeless.

Being separated from my loved ones, friends and the Buffalo fellowship has been hard on me emotionally. But because of the people who have taken their time to continue to share with me through letters, visits and by phone I still feel very much a part of the fellowship.

I still consider my home group to be Living Sober in Kenmore. My sobriety date continues to be recognized by that group. In fact they gave my fiancé my one year pin in October, even though I couldn't be present. I can't express in words how much, that alone, meant to me.

This week was especially hard on me because of the recent holidays and knowing my fiancé is still being affected by what I did 15 months ago. In fact, I don't believe I ever hurt as bad as I did this last week. My sponsor helped me through this tough time. His insistence that I focus on

just today and to continue to apply the principles given to us in the first 164 pages of the Big Book helped me to pull myself through it.

I just want to express my gratitude to those of you, like Ron, who bring the program to us. We need you! Yeah, I'm behind the walls of a prison and we all face different circumstances and situations in our daily lives. But, I'm still a lot like you in one way: I'm an alcoholic and I need you to help me stay sober.

Ron, keep up the good work. I know the inmates at Wende are grateful for you, just as I am for those special people who continue to share the AA way of life with me.

For those of you thinking about doing service work, I beg you to give prisons a try. You may find it saves your life by keeping you sober one day at a time. Or you may say something to an inmate that will give him the courage and strength to help him through one more day.

**A screener is an important liason between an alcoholic in need and a 12 Step volunteer. This service can be extremely important to someone reaching out for help.**

**Those who attended the screeners' meeting divided up the 12 Step List to check if those individuals were still committed to performing 12 Step Calls. An updated list is to be submitted for the next meeting.**

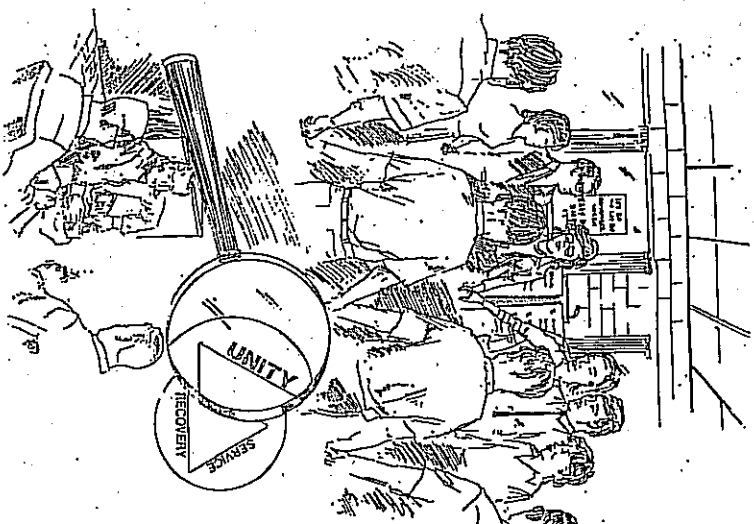
