FREEDOM ISN'T FREE

One evening, a while ago, my wife and I were watching TV. Then the electricity went out and we were plunged into darkness. After a moment or two of fumbling around we found the flashlight, lit some candles, and got the old kerosene lamp fired-up. We were no longer in total darkness. That reminded me that in terms of alcohol I was and remain powerless. But there are things I can do to have the light shine in my life. I can take action today. My Creator has all the power for me to stay sober, one day at a time, I just need to plug in and throw the switch.

No more than I can see the electrical current that lights my home, can I see the power that comes from God. Yet the evidence is clear that both exist. Most of the time my lights turn on when I flip the switch. Likewise, when I plug into the Unseen Power I have the ability to stay sober for another 24 hours. And that Source is available "twenty-four / seven" unless I unplug.

When the lights went out one thought that quickly flashed through my mind was "Oh my God, did I forget to pay the bill." I had paid it, there was just an interruption in service. That thought reminds me that my home's power is not free. In fact there are two charges on my monthly bill. The first is for the actual electricity used and the second is for the "delivery charges" to get that electricity to me so I can use it. Included in the second are the cost of the power lines, employees that keep things working and fix things when broke, sub-stations that distribute the power, and so on.

The power I get from the Creator to stay sober is free. No charge whatsoever. In Alcoholics Anonymous there an inverse twist on the electrical theme. We individual AAs are directly plugged into the Source, we feed that to others at our sub-stations (meetings) that distribute it onward to our grid - the District, Area and GSO.

My daily reprieve from alcohol is freedom and as the bumper sticker says: "Freedom isn't free". Like it or not there are "delivery charges" that supports this freedom. While some of these are material most are of the spiritual nature. I support my freedom in several ways:

- I am willing to give up both the pleasure and pain of alcohol by staying sober no matter what.
- I nurture my spiritual condition through daily contact with a Power greater than myself, even it is nothing more than "help me" in the morning and "thank you" at night.
- I am responsible for keeping AA alive by attending meetings.
- I am responsible for doing service work at whatever level is needed.
- I contribute as much as I can toward the cost of carrying the AA message. Freedom is not free, but it is well worth the price.



It's Ours. We Own It. We're Responsible For It.

What is "it"? I am speaking of AAWS (Alcoholics Anonymous World Services, Inc.), an indispensable organization that is a part of and wonderfully supports our General Service Office (GSO). AAWS is our publishing company. Why am I writing this? There are various companies selling copies of the Big Book that do not come from our AAWS. This means that for every book sold through these companies, we're losing, little by little, our own vital financial lifeblood. While we certainly have the right to purchase from whom we choose, I would like to address everyone in an attempt for us all to be fully informed before we make the decision about where we buy our Big Books.



Did you know all the services our GSO performs on behalf of A.A. groups are partly funded by the sale of our literature? GSO does for us what we cannot do for ourselves, in a manner of speaking. Providing a publishing company (AAWS) that publishes all of our conference-approved literature is one of those services we cannot do for ourselves. GSO now has the Big Book of Alcoholics Anonymous translated into 53 languages. Much of our other literature (conference-approved books and pamphlets) is also translated into various languages. Our message is being carried worldwide by GSO through the efforts of our AAWS. This is our publishing company, and we need to continue to support these efforts by purchasing from ourselves. Many of our fellow AA's may not realize how financially important their purchase of AAWS literature is. Their, and our, purchase of our literature through AAWS helps provide for an invaluable archive, providing services for Loners and Internationalists, Public Information, Cooperation with the Professional Community, Correctional Facilities, Treatment Facilities, conducting our A.A. International Convention, general correspondence and service material, International and World Service meetings, General Service Conference, A.A. Regional Forums, Spanish Services and the A.A. Grapevine. This is a lot! It is obvious we need to continue to support ourselves through the purchase of our literature. What happens if we don't? Services will be cut, and where would we start cutting?

Here is what Bill W. had to say about purchasing literature from our own organization: "Some of us have another concern, and this is related to so-called book "profits." The fact that A.A. Headquarters and most of the groups sell books for more than they cost is thought to be spiritually bad. But is this sort of noncommercial book income really a profit after all? In my view, it is not. This net income to the groups and to A.A.'s General Services is actually the sum of a great many contributions which the book buyers make to the general welfare of Alcoholics Anonymous. The certain and continuous solvency of our world services rests squarely upon these contributions. Looked at in this way, our Reserve Fund is seen to be actually the aggregate of many small financial sacrifices made by the book buyers. This fund is not the property of private investors; it is wholly owned by A.A. itself." *Taken from The A.A. Service Manual, Warranty Two, pages 67 & 68.*

While I've talked so much about money, this is about so much more. Here's why: We lost the copy-write to the first edition of the Big Book. That explains why other companies can publish our

book, and they can do it cheaper because they do not have all the above services to our fellow AAs attached to the cost. ***By purchasing a Big Book from our AAWS, we help ensure that Alcoholics Anonymous and all of the services GSO does for us, will be here for those who follow our footsteps.***

Our Regional Trustee, Gary K., has made the following statement on this topic: "I cannot obviously speak for the AAWS Board. Any AA Group, through its (hopefully informed) group conscience, can purchase literature of any kind and character from any source it chooses. As servants we do not govern. Most of us in AA agree that it is BEST that we try to purchase books etc. from AAWS, Inc. for the reasons you stated, but perhaps more importantly

for the services the dollars spent on AA literature help to provide, this due to the fact that the Groups do not fully support the services they have requested GSO provide. There are, near as we can tell, approximately 13 outside entities producing our book (albeit the first edition) in various and sundry form (including variants on the original manuscript). Some, like AP, insist they are AA groups, making them virtually immune to any adverse action from AAWS except if currently copyrighted materials are involved. These entities, if they are groups, are working outside the conscience of AA as a whole. Keep in mind that many years ago the groups delegated the literature publishing operations for the Fellowship (first to Works Publishing, now AAWS, Inc.). These efforts to publish our basic text, regardless of edition, in my mind are efforts to derail the group conscience for AA as a whole. It is indeed a sad state of affairs when these folks seemingly with impunity, go outside the process to do what they want to do. It's an example of how self-centered we really can be at times. I can only hope that by continuing to educate our Fellowship about how the dollars spent for AAWS literature go towards supporting our service office and structure, and help to provide basic services to the groups and members, a situation which these other entities have less than no interest in. This year, we pared about \$850,000 out of the operating budget to hold down price increases, yet were still unable to forestall the July 1 price increase on all books except the Big Book. I still believe in my heart that if the groups were to demonstrate their responsibilities to AA as a whole by fully supporting GSO through contributions, the price of the literature, over time, would come down to a point hopefully where it was sold at near-cost. At these prices, there is very little economic incentive for outsiders to publish our books. That, in the end, might be the only way to dissuade these folks from continuing in these disruptive endeavors."

Our co-founder, Bill W., and Regional Trustee, Gary K., point out how important it is to support the organization--our organization--which has saved our lives. The Board of Trustees of the San Antonio Central Service Office requires that we purchase all our conference-approved literature from AAWS.

For the month of February we've chosen the significant date of Nell Wing's passing on Valentines day in 2007. This first archivist in AA has been quite an interesting character as we learn about the history of AA. She appealed to my hoarder character defect when I read about her in the free to anyone ARCHIVES newsletter named "Markings" (http://www.aa.org/newsletters/en_US/f-151_markings_spring07.pdf) regarding her penchant for going through Bill's trashcans at the end of day to squirrel away documentation that she recognized may be valuable to AA at a later date, which proved to be the beginnings of the archives.

She didn't have a librarian background or training but did what she could to keep track in a system that is still used today, primarily because of direction she got from Ernie Kurtz. He was doing a book named "Not God" and was given by Nell unfettered access to all of the archives. He encouraged her to go to the Smithsonian Institute for pertinent archivist classes on being an archivist and the management of her vast collection.

Her book "Grateful to Have Been There" is quite an interesting read. Our upcoming speaker at the April 2016 Archives Breakfast did a talk on her that was handed to me on CD when I first came into the archives committee. Gail spoke about one of the statements those of us in AA have had happen to most of us - like those who complain about the coffee getting that task handed to them. Gail met Nell Wing and told her she would help if there was ever anything she could do, and Nell Wing assigned her the task of creating the Akron Archives that so many have journeyed through on the Akron Founders Day trip some of us have been blessed to take. Nell taught her that Gail could not put the Akron Archives in Dr. Bob's house - taught Gail about tradition and the importance of AA not owning property, which changed her trail at that time.

Dear Friends:

It is with great sadness that we share the news that Nellie Elizabeth Wing, AA's first Archivist, died on Wednesday, February 14, 2007 at 7:00 p.m. after a lengthy illness. Nell was 89 years old.

There was a service held on Saturday, February 24, 2007 from 1:00pm to 5:00pm at the Moore's Funeral Home at 1591 Alps Rd, Wayne, NJ 07470.

At 5 P.M. representatives of the US Coast Guard presented the family with a flag. (Nell served there till 1946 when she came to AA)

Many of us in AA feel that God brings the right people into our lives, at the right time and in the right way. This was certainly true of Nell Wing. She came to work at GSO in a temporary job in March 1947 and stayed until her retirement in 1982.

Though a nonalcoholic, her devotion to AA became nearly absolute, and as the years passed she formed friendships with members throughout the world. She never married, and AA really became her extended family, with Bill and Lois W. as her surrogate parents.

Nell was 29 when she reported to work at GSO (then called the Alcoholic Foundation). She had attended Keuka College in central New York state and served two years as a SPAR (a female Coast Guard sailor). She only wanted short-term employment until leaving for Mexico to study sculpture under the G.I. Bill. But as she recalled later, *From the beginning, I was caught by the A.A. Fellowship, particularly by the caring. It was not so much a general 'caring for our fellowman,' but a one-on-one caring, a love for one another without thought of any reward.* Mexico faded into the background, and she spent 35 years at GSO!

Nell served as receptionist and did other clerical work at GSO before becoming Bill's secretary in 1950. Highly competent as a secretary, she also became Bill's staunch defender, giving him support and reassurance when members wrote angry letters or when he became plagued by self-doubt and depression. More than almost anybody, Nell knew how much Bill suffered when attacked by the very people who should have been grateful to him. After his death in 1971, she said she lost *my close friend and confidant, the big brother/father figure of my middle life.*

She then became AA's first archivist, with responsibility for organizing and filing all the documents and other records of our history. Though not trained in library science, she quickly learned the essentials of archiving and set up a logical system that works extremely well to this day. She also continued as Bill's loyal advocate and carefully documented his specific contributions to AA's origin, growth, and success.

Nell and Lois became even closer after Bill's passing. Nell often spent weekends with Lois at Stepping Stones and became concerned that the older woman insisted on living alone though becoming increasingly frail. Lois's passing in 1988 was another great loss in her life.

Envelope System – We had \$737 in donations this month for a total of \$6,972 year to date. Last year we received \$625 in donations and \$7,150 year to date. Comparatively speaking, we only lost \$178 year to date, which I feel is good considering we lost 4 donors through their passing, relocation, or poor health. I would like to thank everyone who has donated this year through the envelope system. Please keep in mind this is a tax-deductible donation and it helps support the Central Office which in turn supports you. Please remember to announce this donation opportunity at your home group. Hopefully this function will seamlessly transfer into the capable hands of our executive secretary.

Steering Committee – There was no quorum thus no business was conducted at the last meeting.

Financial - December 2015: *Amounts rounded to the nearest \$1.00 except balances.* Thank you to the groups supporting WNY AA! **Total Income:** \$10,186. Of that, Literature Sales were \$4,759. Group contributions were \$3,912. **Total Expenses:** \$12,041. **Monthly Net:** *Negative* \$1,855. **Asset Account Balances:** **Checking Account:** \$16,033.27. **Petty Cash:** \$3,000. **Prudent Reserve:** \$28,137.84 with interest of \$0.48. **Inventory:** \$13,226.06, with purchases in December of \$3,208. **Corrections Committee:** Balance is \$1,928.45. Contributions were \$254 and expenses were \$3. **Treatment Committee:** Balance is \$655.60. Contributions were \$229 & expenses were \$563. **Group Accounts Receivable:** Balance is \$200.81 from 3 groups. Of that, 2 with \$133.47 are current to 30 days, 1 with \$61.34 is over 30 days. **Year End 2015 & 2014 for comparison:** (*Amounts rounded to the nearest thousand for the rest of the report*). Total Income was \$107,000; in 2014 it was \$120,000. Literature sales were \$46,000; in 2014 it was \$43,000. Group contributions were \$47,000; in 2014 it was \$54,000. Expenses were \$121,000; in 2014 it was \$113,000. Net for the year was negative \$14,000; in 2014 it was a positive \$7,000. **Observation:** Every expense for Central Committee has increased except for the 4 line items that essentially stayed the same. Those increases in 2015 were accompanied by a corresponding decrease in group contributions, which resulted in the \$14,000 loss this year. If the 2014 convention did not contribute almost \$10,000 in 2014, we would be looking at a negative net at the end of the past two years. On the other hand, remember we have a \$30,000 Prudent Reserve and \$16,000 in the main operations checking account. It is not time to call the fire department yet — but I would say there are some embers that should be watched in the future. *Respectfully Submitted, Chip R, Lighten Up Group*

Treatment - The treatment committee is currently responsible for bringing the hand of Alcoholics Anonymous into 5 facilities. With the help of 30+ groups, there are collectively 9 "tfc meetings" a week going on at these facilities.

At our last meeting members were voted into yearly jobs, most notably Bobby B. from Williamsville group as our new co-chair. 13 members and 8 groups represented. We are currently discussing what pamphlets to provide at our meetings and will be voting on that at our next meeting.

Outside of joining our committee, there are a few areas where AA members, and groups, can be of service through treatment.

1. Individuals may take a speaking commitment at Horizon Village Terrace House on a Thursday at 6pm.
2. There are three open weeks available for groups to take a commitment at Renaissance House on Wednesday at 8. This is a men's meeting.
3. All groups who currently have commitments through the Treatment Committee can, and should, send a representative to our monthly committee meeting to inform us about anything more we could be doing to be of service to them, and also to allow us to inform their groups, through them, about anything pertinent to their continued Twelfth step work through TFC. Thank you to all groups and individuals who are involved in this vital 12th step work. To get involved or if there are any issues you need to contact us about please email us at buffalotfc@gmail.com, or at our monthly meeting the 3rd Monday of the month 1/18/16 6pm at Central Office.

Corrections - Over the last month the committee has continued to develop a informational presentation which is to be given to individual groups at their business meeting. We are hoping that in doing this we will become more visible as a committee and gather more participants for county and state facilities. There is a great need and little service especially for state facilities. At the moment we have about 5 people who are cleared and actively bringing meetings into the state facilities which includes Wende, Collins and Gowanda. Getting clearance is now a little bit faster and easier through the use of online applications. We can email any AA member a copy of the blank application which can be filled out electronically and emailed back to the committee. Also, the committee is continuing to work with the Area 50 chair as he attempts to coordinate with all four Inter-groups in Area 50


