Shalom

From Jerusalem, Israel:

The two Moslem gentleman were neatly dressed and very shy; they sat quietly through the entire Friday afternoon meeting of the Jerusalem Shalom AA Group while the rest of us caught up with each other after the trials and celebrations of the Easter/Passover holiday. Our chairman, a young Jew who had come into AA as an alcoholic child, noticed that they hadn't spoken and asked them if they wanted to say anything before the meeting closed.

They did, and despite some difficulty with English, they told their stories. Living far from AA meetings and hesitant to approach the mainly Jewish meetings in Jerusalem, they had gotten sober reading AA books, but now they realized they also needed the fellowship of other alcoholics to stay sober. So they gathered their courage and came to ask if they could be a part of our meeting.

The response was a heartfelt outpouring of warmth and love, which almost overwhelmed them. We had Arabic literature waiting for the first people who might need it. A Catholic nurse offered to help set up an Arabic language meeting, and I volunteered to participate since I live on the West Bank. We closed with the serenity prayer, which is posted in English, Hebrew and Arabic in our meeting room, and I stood holding hands with a Moslem on one side and an Orthodox Jew on the other. The Moslems asked for telephone numbers, and nearly everyone in the room gave them theirs. When I left, the two men were exchanging numbers with a grizzled Jewish West Bank settler.

I've been reading a lot about AA in North America, where the trend seems to be toward fission: AA for atheists, AA for women, AA for Christians, etc. Here, because we are so few, we move toward fusion. We know we have to hang together in order to remain viable. We have only 400 AA members in all of Israel, two in the Palestine areas, and a couple more in Jordan, both of them Loners. (There must be more drunks in the area – and in fact there are – but with all the division of culture, religion, and ethnicity in our region, reaching out is very limited and difficult.) As a result, we've needed to learn tolerance and acceptance of one another. We've discovered it can be done and have been enriched by the discovery. We've learned that God is indeed operating in Jerusalem meetings and doesn't seem to care much whether we call him God or Allah or HaShem. So why should we? Perhaps this is a lesson that can be used elsewhere, even when the divisions among people are not so great as they are here.

World Convention In Toronto 2005 Frequently Asked Questions -Registration, Hotels & Transportation-from www.aa.org

In a little less than two years, the International Convention will celebrate A.A.'s 70th Anniversary, June 30-July 3, 2005, in Toronto, Canada. With a theme of "I Am Responsible!," A.A.s from around the world will converge on Toronto to celebrate sobriety, and share experience, strength and hope in meetings, panels and workshops at the Metro Toronto Convention Center, the SkyDome Stadium, and at other locations throughout that beautiful city. Members of the Fellowhip, as always, are now gearing up for this wonderful event and the General Service Office is beginning to receive inquiries. So here are some answers to the most frequently asked questions regarding the Convention.

Registration

Q When will registration forms be available?
A Registration forms and housing information will be mailed in August of 2004 to all G.S.Rs, Central Offices and Intergroups and international G.S.O.s.

Q What about on-site registration?

A On-site registration will be set up in the South Building of the Metro Toronto Convention Center. Registration will open on Wednesday morning, June 29, 2005.

Q Will I be able to register over the Internet?

A Yes. There will be links to forms to register and sign up for housing on the G.S.O. Web site.

Q How much will registration cost?

A Registration fees will be established in 2004.

Q Must everyone register? I thought I didn't have to pay to go to an A.A. event.

A Yes. Everyone must register. Attendance at this special celebration is voluntary and, as responsible A.A. members, "we pay our own way."

Q Can travel agents register groups or individuals?

A Payments from travel agencies to register groups will not be accepted. Individuals must register themselves.

Q When can I register for my hotel mom?

A Once we have received your registration form and fee, a housing form will be sent to you,

Q Can members contact hotels themselves?

A No. To make the process as fair as possible, all housing requests will be processed through the official Housing Bureau. As was done in Mirmeaplois, hotel rooms will be assigned through a lottery, taking into consideration, as best as can be done, individual preferences. We need your help in exoperating with this housing process.

Q What are the main hotels?

A The headquarter hotels will be within walking distance of the convention center and the SkyDome and, aside from the Royal York, are as yet to be determined.

Q Can travel agents make room reservations?

A Room reservations can only be made in individual

people's names. Rooms available through the Housing Bureau, at specially-negotiated Convention rates, are not commissionable to travel agents. Once hotels have been assigned by the Housing Bureau, confirmation will be sent to you by the hotels.

Q Can we request a room in the same hotel with friends? A Yes, if you submit your housing forms together, in the same envelope with the same hotel choices and deposits, every effort will be made to house you together. Q If 50 of us are coming together from the same area, can we be in the same hotel?

A We do make an effort to accommodate group housing requests. There is a separate procedure for this to ensure fairness while trying to meet your needs. Contact the G.S.O. International Convention Coordinator for information on procedures for groups of 25 or more at 212-870-AAAA or 2005IC@aa.org

Transportation

Q Will local transportation be available?

A A.A. will provide transportation to and from most A.A.-assigned hotels and motels. This will be at no additional cost to the attendee. Toronto has an excellent and easy to use public transportation system and their routes can also be used (there may be a nominal charge for this service). Of the 13,000 rooms AA has blocked, nearly 8000 rooms are in downtown Toronto, so many members will be in walking distance or a short ride on public transportation from their accomodations. All housing blocked for this event is less than a 45 minute ride from the convention center and stadium.

Q What about special airline rates?

A As at other International Conventions, there will be special fares available. That information will be available with the August 2004 registration information mailing. Q Where can I find information about crossing the border into Canada for this event?

A On the A.A. G.S.O. Web site www.aa.org there is another service piece called Frequently Asked Questions About Travel to Canada for the A.A. 2005 International Convention which provides information on many border crossing matters.

Q Where do I obtain more information about the 2005 International Convention?

A More information will be available throughout 2004 and 2005 in Box 4-5-9 and on G.S.O.'s website www.aa.org. All necessary information will be included in the registration packet which will be available August 2004. This packet will also list special telephone numbers to call for answers to specific questions about housing, the program, tours, etc. A.A.'s website will be updated as more information becomes available.

Are You A Carrot, An Egg, or a Coffee Bean?

A young woman went to her mother and told her about her life and how things were so hard for her. She did not know how she was going to make it and wanted to give up. She was tired of fighting and struggling. It seemed as one problem was solved a new one arose.

Her mother took her to the kitchen. She filled three pots with water. In the first, she placed carrots, in the second she placed eggs, and in the last she placed ground coffee beans. She let them sit and boil without saying a word.

In about 20 minutes she turned off the burners. She fished the carrots out and placed them in a bowl. She pulled the eggs out and placed them in a bowl. Then she ladled the coffee out and place it in a bowl. Turning to her daughter, she asked, "Tell me, what do you see?"

"Carrots, eggs and coffee," she replied.

The mother brought her closer and asked her to feel the carrots. She did and noted they were soft. The mother then asked her to take an egg and break it. After pulling off the shell, she observed the hard-boiled egg. Finally she was asked to sip the coffee. The daughter smiled as she tasted its rich aroma, and asked, "What's the point Mother?"

Her mother explained that each of these objects had faced the same adversity - boiling water - but each reacted differently. The carrot went in strong, hard and unrelenting, but after being subjected to the boiling water, it softened and became weak. The egg had been fragile, its thin outer shell protecting its liquid interior. But after sitting in the boiling water, its inside became hardened. The ground coffee beans were unique, however. After they were in boiling water, they had changed the water. "Which are you?" she asked her daughter. "When adversity knocks on you door, how do you respond? Are you a carrot, an egg, or a coffee bean?"

Think of this: Which am I? Am I the carrot that seems strong but with pain and adversity I wilt and become soft and loose my strength? Am I the egg that starts with a malleable heart, but changes with the heat? Did I have a fluid spirit, but after a death, a breakup, a financial hardship or some other trial, have I become hardened and stiff? Does my shell look the same, but on the inside am I bitter and tough, with a stiff spirit and a hardened heart?

Or am I like the coffee beans, changing the very circumstance that brings the pain? When the water gets hot, it releases the fragrance and flavor. If you are like the bean, when things are at their worst, you get better and change the situation around you. When the hour is darkest and trials are their greatest, do you elevate to another level?

Why Support your Central Office? Editorial

AA Central Offices are on the front lines in the effort to carry the AA message to individuals, groups, and the public at large. It wasn't always so, however. In AA's early years, questions from alcoholics or their families were directed to "headquarters" in New York City. Bill W. and a few others answered the mail. Remember Dr. Bob was in Akron, OH treating thousands of sick men at St. Thomas Hospital, and Bill W., although a frequent visitor to Akron, was in NYC. Early articles in *The Plain Dealer* helped to spread the news of a way to recover. Letters came from all over the country asking for more information. As the Fellowship grew, so did the need for local offices to handle requests. As Bill later put it, "Goaded by the sheer necessity of the situation, responsible old-timers in such areas would often hire a small office and a paid secretary."

Ringing off the hook: Central Offices are on the front lines of carrying the message to the alcoholic who still suffers. Central Office phones are not only a direct link to the Fellowship for the still suffering alcoholic but also a lifeline for the traveler alone in a strange town and for those needing a meeting at an unforeseen time or place. In addition to telephone information, Central Office offers a complex fabric of services. Printing and mailings of Newsletters & announcements as well as compiling information for the newcomers most important piece of literature — the meeting schedule.

One of the challenges of running the Central Office is that the Central Office can't generate income as an ordinary business does. Our Seventh Tradition clearly states that we are 'self supporting' through our own contributions. Our Central Office must rely on contributions from groups and individuals. Contributions are voluntary, and a contribution is not a requirement for being listed in the meeting schedule or for receiving any of the other services provided.

Please the next time your group has paid all the bills for your meeting hall, coffee etc. send any extra to Central Office. We cannot continue to run in the red! We as individuals and groups are 'RESPONSIBLE when anyone anywhere reaches out for help' that the hand of AA be there.

How many of usdidn't know where to turn, made the phone call and the person on the other end helped us to find a meeting, a detox or rehab? Twelfth Step work lies at the heart of every Central Office, as it does throughout the entire fellowship. It's the wet drunk and the newcomer who renew AA's purpose.

This process of identification and transmission has gone on and on. The Skid-Rower said he was different. Even more loudly, the socialite (or Park Avenue stumblebum) said the same – so did the artists and professional people, the rich, the poor, the religious, the agnostic, the Indians and the Eskimos, the veterans and the prisoners. ... But nowadays all of these, and legions more, soberly talk about how very much alike all of us alcoholics are when we admit that the chips are finally down.




