Little Surrenders ...

About two years ago, I made a fortuitous discovery while experiencing a disturbing episode during my recovery. As a result, the Seventh Step became my tool for everyday coping and living. The emotional impact of this happening was like that of finding a new religion—the feelings of exhilaration persisted for several weeks.

Immediately prior to the discovery, I had worked myself into a near frenzy over distressing evidence of my inability to handle my own financial affairs. My income was adequate, and I knew there was no good reason for running out of money. Of course, this was not the first time it had happened. Once more, I had yielded to impulses to buy things, and my expenditures for the month had far exceeded available funds—or, for that matter, prospects for borrowing money to cover the deficit. My carefully laid budget plans had again proved fruitless.

I was very displeased with myself. Feelings of inadequacy rose. I soon began to doubt that I had any ability at all to cope with life. In a matter of hours, I became despondent and almost desperate. At that point, the thought struck me that I had indeed uncovered a serious character defect. I had never seen this problem in quite that light before, and I knew I had better turn to God for help.

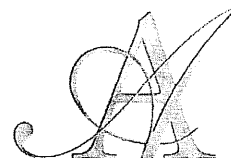
I was sitting in a room all by myself. So I fell to my knees—literally, as A.A. co-founder Dr. Bob always counseled newcomers—and said aloud, "God, help me with this problem, I simply can't handle it." It was really a Seventh Step and also a surrender experience. Almost immediately, I felt relief from the intense anxiety that had built up within me. My mind began to clear. Soon, new thoughts helped me to extricate myself from the dilemma. Weeks later, I developed techniques to prevent me from again committing serious errors of that sort.

A couple of days after that initial discovery, I paused to consider two surrender experiences of mine during my early days in A.A. The first had opened the door to wholehearted acceptance of the A.A. program, resulting in the disappearance of my craving for alcohol in a matter of hours. The second occurred much later and led to a resolution of a serious inner conflict that had stood in the way of reliable sobriety. I realized that although the recent event had been less crucial than the first two, it was still very important.

Furthermore, I saw that this Step approach could be applied whenever I reached a similar impasse of my own making, whether it be of outer circumstances or inner emotions. Whenever I find myself uptight, I fall on my knees, literally or figuratively—depending on my surroundings—and ask God's help. It comes easier to me now. In fact, during the past two years, my life has been marked by a series of these "little surrenders".

As the months have passed and surrender has followed surrender, I have come to a higher insight concerning this application of the Seventh Step. It is this: If I were able to retain the attitude that I achieve during the hours immediately following these crisis experiences, life would be continuously euphoric—I would forever be immersed in the kind of feelings I achieved for only brief periods with alcohol at the beginning. Let's call it a "surrendered attitude". It is the avenue to "the peace ... which passeth all understanding". I perceived that whatever happens to me is not nearly so important as the way I look at the happening—the way I feel about it. We really do carry our worlds within ourselves.

Area 50 Western New York ~ which covers Niagara Falls and Niagara County, Buffalo and Erie County, and Chautauqua, Orleans, Genesee, Wyoming and Cattaraugus Counties.

Area 47 ~ people from as near as Rochester, in Monroe County, and as far as Cortland County in Central New York, speaking of service experiences in their area.

Area 48 ~ includes the state capital, Albany; everything east of Rome and Oneida County and north to Watertown, including the entire Adirondack area to the Canadian border; and all the areas east of the Genesee River Valley to the Hudson River Valley and south to the Catskill Mountain counties.

Area 49 ~ delegate and service committee chairs representing all of Long Island to the east; the five boroughs of New York City; and all of the counties north of NYC to Ulster, Sullivan and Dutchess Counties.

The **Stella Niagara Conference Center** in zip code 14144, located at 4421 Lower River Road, Lewiston, takes about an hour to reach from the Buffalo area. It is a great opportunity to meet service people in a casual setting to get fresh ideas in the many areas of service.

Opening the week-end on Friday evening, August 17th, will be panels by Archives and the *A.A. Grapevine*. Saturday, August 18th, morning panels will include Corrections Committee and Treatment Facilities. Saturday afternoon panels will cover Special Needs, Public Information, and Cooperation with the Professional Community. Sunday morning, August 19th, panels will be presented by Young People, and current delegates reporting on Actions of the General Service Conference. On Saturday evening at 7:00 pm Derrick M. from Sober Train will be the keynote speaker on Service Experience.

In August of 2008 when Western New York last shared the hosting responsibilities, the attendees included eight commuters, five Saturday packages, five with registration only, and 45 people staying the entire week-end.

A committee has been working since last year to put this in place for you. It's informative, casual and well worth your while! Let's come out and share our special hospitality and enthusiasm with other members in service to A.A. across the state. Get your registration in today.

This Month in A.A. ~ Bob D.

To look at the worldwide reach of Alcoholics Anonymous is to wonder how such a fellowship can succeed with but the occasional ripple of discord. Certainly that's not the case in other organizations, where issues of money and/or personal agendas often become divisive forces that fracture the membership bonds. What is it that makes A.A. unique? How is it that this fellowship, born in 1935, has grown from Bill Wilson and Dr. Bob into a legion of millions without the problems that commonly tear at the fabric of so many organizations?

As Alcoholic Anonymous continued to grow in numbers, co-founder Bill W. harbored concern over the fellowship's ability to sustain. The early members were aging. The day would come when they would no longer be here to carry the message and offer guidance on matters pertaining to A.A. ways. Bill formulated a course of action that culminated at the annual convention held in St. Louis in July of 1955. It was then and there that "The Three Legacies" were bestowed upon A.A. Members. "The Three Legacies" are represented by a symbol familiar to most A.A. members: the triangle within the circle.

"The circle stands for the whole world of A.A., and the triangle stands for A.A.'s Three Legacies of Recovery, Unity, and Service," Bill said in a 1955 speech. "Within our wonderful new world, we have found freedom from our fatal obsession. That we have chosen this particular symbol is perhaps no accident. The priests and seers of antiquity regarded the circle enclosing the triangle as a means of warding off spirits of evil, and A.A.'s circle and triangle of Recovery, Unity, and Service has certainly meant all of that to us and much more."

On July 3 1955, by resolution, the Three Legacies of Recovery, Unity and Service were turned over to the fellowship by its old-timers. The resolution was adopted at the Convention by acclamation and by the (General Service) Conference by formal resolution. The final piece was in place to help A.A. endure in perpetuity—so long as its fellows took it to heart.

The First Legacy consists of the A.A.'s 12 Steps of Recovery. It was, of course, a natural No. 1. We alcoholics were of little use to anyone until we had escaped the grasp of John Barleycorn and embraced a new way of living. Recovery is often viewed by non-alcoholics as the bedrock of Alcoholics Anonymous. It is certainly the legacy that receives the most attention among the general public.

But there's reason to question whether Alcoholics Anonymous would today be a vibrant, welcoming and united organization had its founders regarded the 12 Steps as the final answer on the issue of alcoholism. In looking to the future, Bill pondered how A.A. could maintain a singleness of purpose. How could it remain free from outside influences, particularly regarding issues of money?

The Second Legacy, Unity, encompasses the 12 Traditions brought before the first A.A. Convention and adopted in 1950. As we know, the first tradition states that personal recovery depends upon A.A. unity. The remaining 11 traditions set forth how this will be accomplished.

The Third Legacy, in a nutshell, urges A.A. members to take ownership in the fellowship and ensure its immortality by playing an active role. As Bill wrote (in what is now a pamphlet entitled *A.A.'s Legacy of Service*):

"... an A.A. service is anything whatever that helps us to reach a fellow sufferer—ranging all the way from the Twelfth Step itself, a ten-cent phone call and a cup of coffee, to A.A.'s General Service Office for national and international action. The sum total of all these services is our Third Legacy of Service.

"Services include meeting places, hospital cooperation, and intergroup offices; they mean pamphlets, books, and good publicity of almost every description. They call for committees, delegates, trustees, and conferences. And, not to be forgotten, they need voluntary money contributions from within the Fellowship.

"These services, whether performed by individuals, groups, areas, or A.A. as a whole, are utterly vital to our existence and growth. Nor can we make A.A. more simple by abolishing such services. We would only be asking for complication and confusion."

The formation of the Third Legacy was perhaps even more painstaking than the 12 Steps themselves. Beginning in 1951 a General Service Conference was formed and met with A.A. Trustees annually on an experimental basis. The idea was to identify and root out potential pitfalls in this structure. To Bill's surprise and gratitude, any needed tweaks were but minor.

The members of Alcoholics Anonymous were ready to stand as one. And 57 years ago this month the Three Legacies were bestowed upon A.A. members.

"I would rather go through life sober, believing I am an alcoholic,

Editorial: On the 7th Tradition

“The A.A. Groups themselves ought to be fully supported by the voluntary contribution of their own members. We think that each group should soon achieve its ideal: that any public solicitation of funds using the name of Alcoholics Anonymous is highly dangerous, whether by groups, clubs, hospitals or other outside agencies; that acceptance of large gifts from any source, or of contributions carrying any obligation whatever, is unwise. Then too, we view with much concern those A.A. treasuries which continue, beyond prudent reserves, to accumulate funds for no stated A.A. purpose. Experience has often warned us that nothing can so surely destroy our spiritual heritage as futile disputes over property, money, and authority.”

Our growth continuing, the combined income of Alcoholics Anonymous members will soon reach the astounding total of \$250,000,000, a quarter of billion dollars yearly. This is the direct result of A.A. membership. Sober we now have it, drunk we would not.

By contrast, our overall A.A. expenses are trifling.

For instance, the A.A. General Office now costs us \$1.50 per member a year. As a fact, the New York office asks the groups for this sum twice a year because not all of them contribute. Even so, the sum per member is exceedingly small. If an A.A. happens to live in a large metropolitan center where an intergroup office is absolutely essential to handle heavy inquiries and hospital arrangements he contributes (or probably should contribute) about \$5.00 annually. To pay the rent of his own group meeting place, and maybe coffee and doughnuts, he might drop \$25.00 a year in the hat. Or, if he belongs to a club it could be \$50.00. In case he takes the *A.A. Grapevine* he squanders an extra \$2.50.

So, the A.A. member who really meets his group responsibilities finds himself liable for about \$5.00 a month on the average. Yet his own personal income may be anywhere between \$200. and \$2000. a month—the direct result of not drinking.

“But,” some will contend, “our friends want to give us money to furnish that new clubhouse. We are a new small group. Most of us are still pretty broke. What then?”

I am sure that myriads of the A.A. voices would now answer the new group saying, “Yes, we know just how you feel. We once solicited money ourselves. We even solicited publicly. We thought we could do a lot of good with other peoples’ money. But we found that kind of money too hot to handle. It aroused unbelievable controversy. It simply wasn’t worth it. Besides, it set a precedent which has tempted many people to use the valuable name of Alcoholics Anonymous for other than A.A. purposes. While there may be little harm in a small friendly loan which your group really means to repay, we really beg you to think hard before you ask the most willing friend to make a large donation. You can, and you soon will, pay your own way. For each of you these overhead expenses will never amount to more than the price of one bottle of good whiskey a month. You will be everlastingly thankful if you pay this small obligation yourselves.

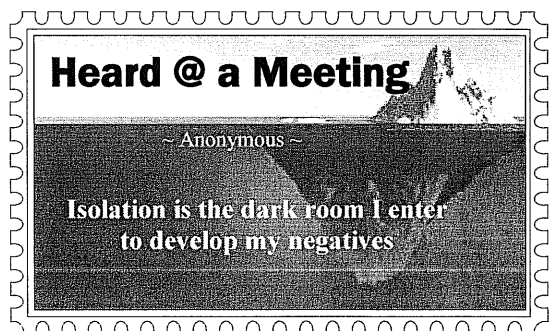
When reflecting on these things, why should not each of us tell himself, “Yes, we A.A.s were once a burden on everybody. We were ‘takers’. Now that we are sober, and by the Grace of God have become responsible citizens of the world, why shouldn’t we now about face and become ‘thankful givers’! Yes, it is high time we did!”

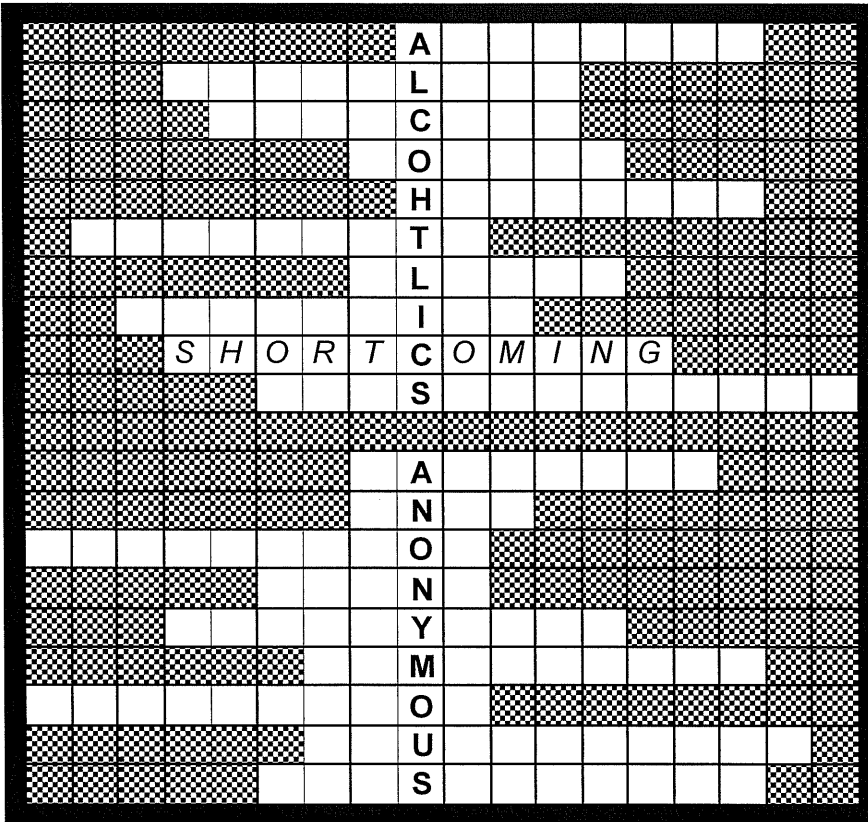
7th Step Prayer

to do your bidding. Amen



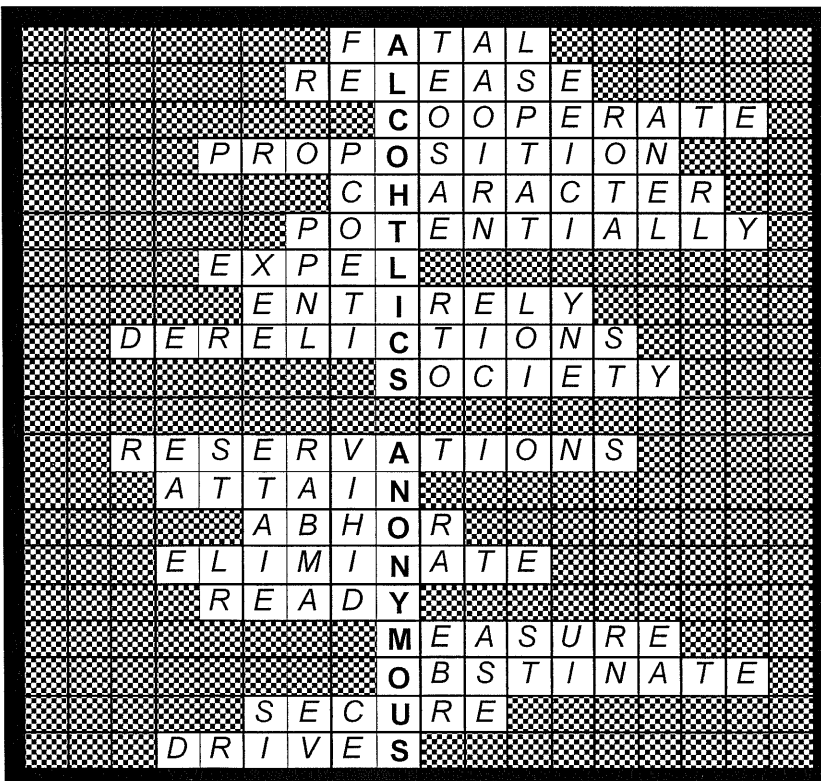

TO ALL GROUPS IN DISTRICT 1
