

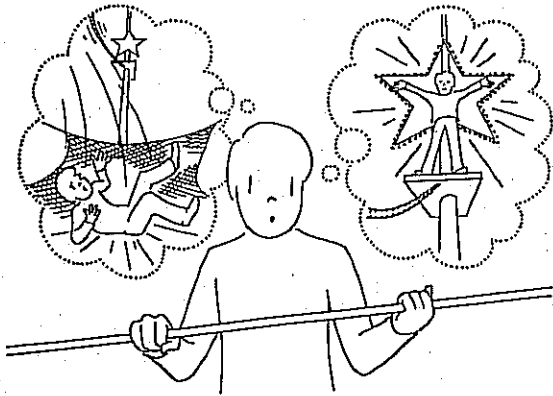

Special Forum: Corrections Facilities Panel Carrying the Message Inside



There's a great need for those who speak Spanish, to aid Hispanic prisoners eager to embrace the AA message. Hispanic groups are springing up, one was even started by a counselor who received his certification while a prisoner. He has a relapse program, and the people he sees at meetings tickle him pink. Some, however, rebel because they're mandated to attend meetings. But at least they're exposed to AA, and will have some chance.

Young people are also in jail waiting for court. Some are runaways, juvenile offenders, bike stealers, etc. It's a detention facility, and kids come and go. Renaissance House is a long-term treatment center for teenagers, and is difficult to get into because of the system. Some are going from East Ferry Juvenile School into the Renaissance House now. A deal is worked out where the teen receives a suspended judgement on the condition that they cooperate with the Renaissance House, with an option to detain. If that person runs, a warrant is issued, this cuts down on binge time.

The waiting list for Renaissance House is four months. East Ferry Juvenile School doesn't have that long. A lot of kids who need the AA message aren't receiving it. Most of juvenile offenders want to seek membership in AA.

The principal of East Ferry Juvenile School, a friend of AA, has been trying to go to bat for youthful offenders. But some courts have barred his efforts, because they don't understand what he's trying to do.

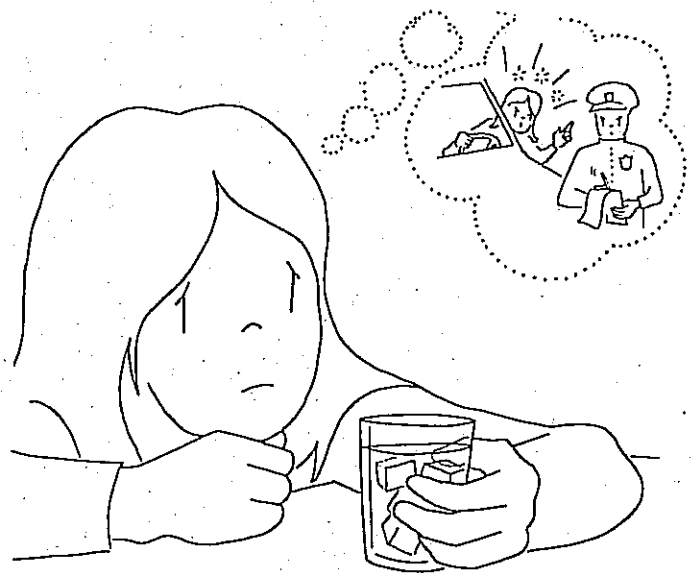
It's difficult getting volunteers for prison work, particularly women. But those who do participate do find numerous rewards in this service. Volunteers report they feel safe and secure when the doors slam shut behind them, and they let the inmates run their own meeting, giving support where it is needed. Many friends come back after discharge to say how much they were helped by the volunteers.

Inmates have access to booze and drugs in prison. They need to learn how to live in society, as we all did, so there's a great need to carry the AA message inside jail. Take, for example, a woman named Geneva. Because the message of recovery was brought inside to her, she became sober. The first five years of her sobriety were behind the walls. She continued to stay sober for twenty-nine years. So the question of this workshop is how can the AA message be brought more effectively into prison so that there are more success stories like Geneva.

It's never a good idea to take cigarettes into the prisons. The attraction should come from who were are in the fellowship. The appearance and speech of an AA volunteer is very important, therefore. We as AA members plant the seed, and let God worry about harvesting the crop. You may never know who you help, but if someone comes up to you, maybe years later, it feels good to know you played some small part in their recovery.

Some meetings inside are better than AA meetings on the outside. This is because a lot of inmates are working honestly on themselves. They are learning how to live without a drink, one day at a time, and this is of supreme benefit to those of us who might of become complacent.

Literature is very important. \$500.00 spent on a group anniversary, dance, or other AA celebration could provide eighty Big Books that have the potential to change eighty lives. The Corrections Committee as instituted the Pink Can Fund in this area for donations to provide texts to those incarcerated.



But those who are still afraid can become involved through donations to the Corrections Committee. Your donations go toward the purchase of literature so badly needed by the prisoners.

All we can do is carry the AA message to those behind the walls. Some get it, some don't. So we have to know when to let go and let God.

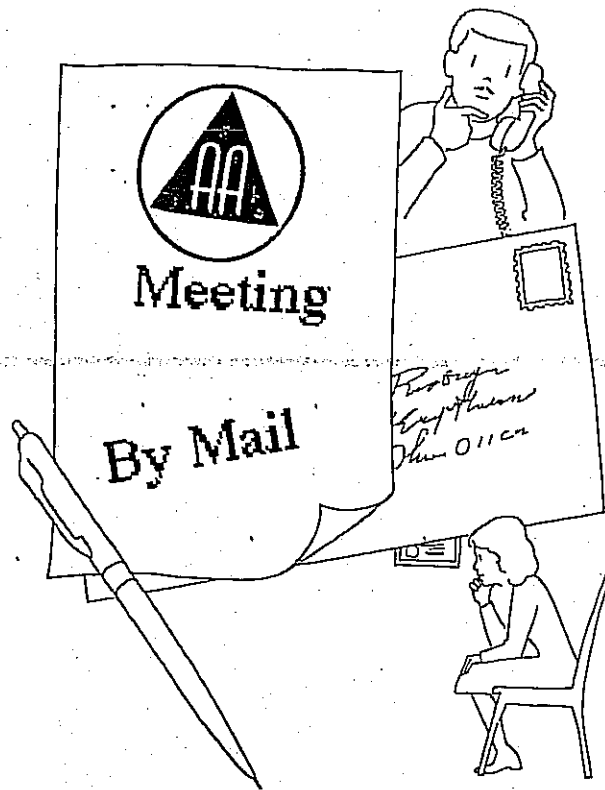

When I first came into AA I heard people talking about a Capt. John. I also heard about people involved with "World Hello." So I wrote GSO in New York and asked about it. They sent me the info about Loners. Since I was in an area with a lot of meetings, I could belong as a sponsor. I read the article in "Grapevine" about Capt. Jack's meeting by mail. There were people who were in AA who have a physical handicaps which impede them from going to meetings. I became a sponsor for the Great Lakes here in WNY.

Being in World War II, I remember the men at mail call, and the faces of those who didn't get any mail. So I thought Loners and "World Hello" would let me work on our primary purpose as Dr. Bob and Bill W. did, one alcoholic helping another alcoholic stay sober, (in my case it's for me.) So I started writing people in the Peace Corps, those who lived in Alaska and parts of Canada, especially, in the winter. Many of them had to go seventy-five miles to get to the nearest AA meeting.

I thought I could help those in Eastern Europe who just got their freedom. I remember reading articles about the days when it was hard to be a member of AA, because the rules in the Communist countries. So I began to correspond, with a person from Romania. I came to find out that she was raised in Ontario, Canada. Because of her, I am writing to a person in Belgium, who when he came into AA he found a new hobby. He started to collect stamps instead of empty bottles.

I sent the girl my sixth month medallion for her sixth month anniversary. AA is getting stronger there, and they know they are not alone anymore.



I read in "Hello World" there was a Homer with twenty-five years sobriety, but could not get to an AA meeting because physical disability. A "Homer" is different from a "Loner" because they are physically unable to get to meetings. Writing Homers makes me more grateful than any thing else. Homers and Loners are particularly inspiring to me because of their knowledge of AA literature. They stay sober primarily by reading the Big Book and Loners Internationalist, so their insights are invaluable.

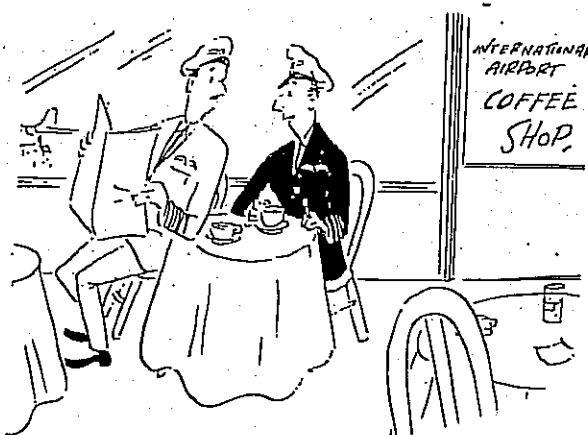
You can work on our primary purpose by mail. It's one alcoholic helping another stay sober. In my case my pen pal helps me more than I can help them. Being a Loner sponsor as many unforeseen benefits. For example, when I was in the hospital for a hip replacement and a broken wrist, I got cards and letters from all over the world. That made all the difference in the world to my recovery. Also, you know what is going on in other countries.

An AA friend just returned from Russia. He's originally from Finland. He told me those people have a very strong spirituality now that they are free and AA is growing there. I like to think that Loners and "World Hello" played some small part in planting those spiritual seeds of the program.

I have found that by sharing with others you never have to be bored with your sobriety. I write to over thirty AA people all over the world. Remember when you were in service and how important mail was to you. I write to people in the Army and Navy and those who have returned to civilian life how important receiving AA correspondence was in helping them stay sober.

Give it a try. It might help your sobriety. Remember, you must give it away in order to keep it.

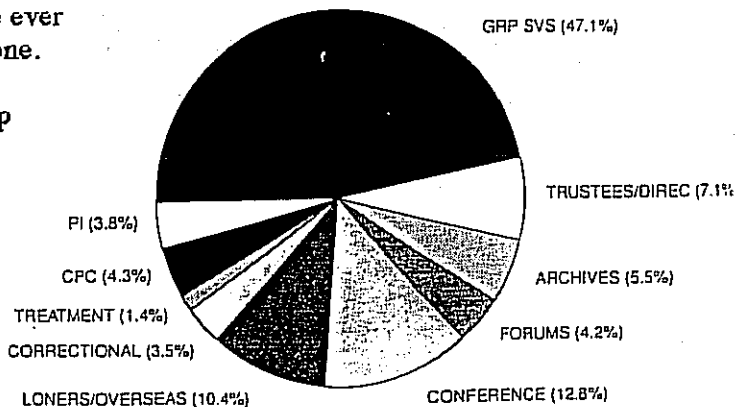

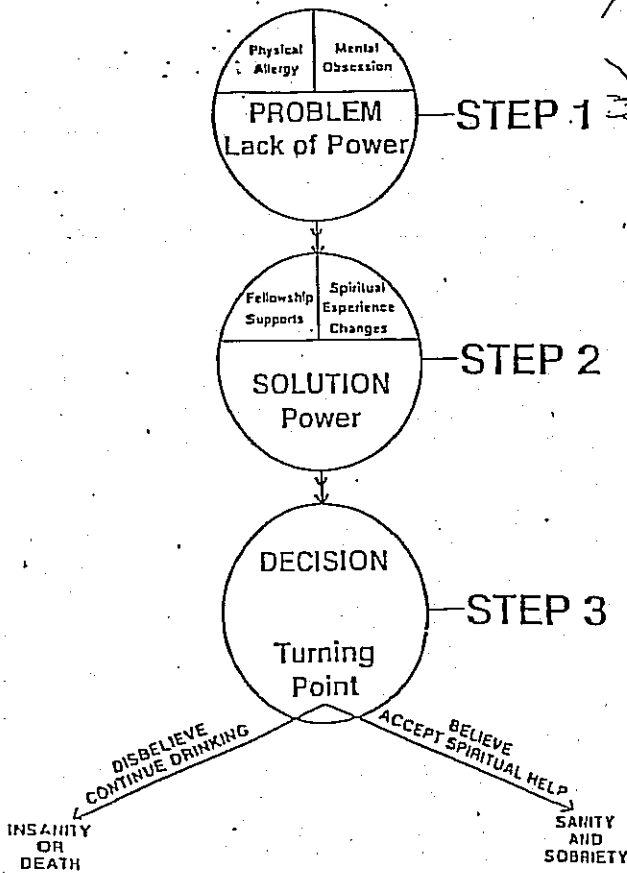

Therefore, we started upon a personal inventory. This was Step Four. A business which takes no regular inventory usually goes broke. Taking a commercial inventory is a fact-finding and a fact-facing process. It is an effort to discover the truth about the stock-in-trade. One object is to disclose damaged or unsalable goods, to get rid of them promptly and without regret. If the owner of the business is to be successful, he cannot fool himself about values.

We did exactly the same thing with our lives. We took stock honestly. First, we searched out the flaws in our make-up which caused our failure. Being convinced that self, manifested in various ways, was what had defeated us, we considered its common manifestations.

Resentment is the "number one" offender. It destroys more alcoholics than anything else. From it stem all forms of spiritual disease, for we have been not only mentally and physically ill, we have been spiritually sick. When the spiritual malady is overcome, we straighten out mentally and physically. In dealing with resentments, we set them on paper. We listed people, institutions or principles with whom we were angry. We asked ourselves why we were angry. In most cases it was found that our self-esteem, our pocketbooks, our ambitions, our personal relationships

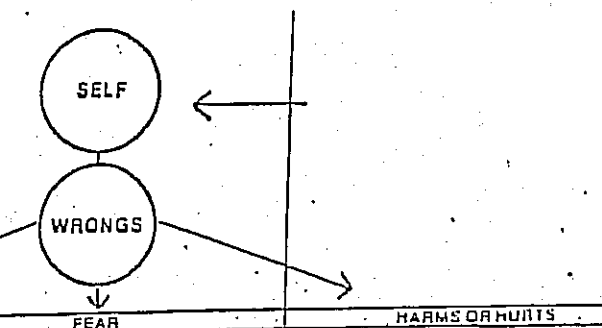
HOW IT WORKS

(including sex) were hurt or threatened. So we were sore. We were "burned up."

On our grudge list we set opposite each name our injuries. Was it our self-esteem, our security, our ambitions, our personal, or sex relations, which had been interfered with?

We were usually as definite as this example:

The Third Step prayer amounts to only words and empty promises if it isn't followed by the rigorous action program as outlined in the Big Book of Alcoholics Anonymous. Starting at Step Three, a member of AA is encouraged to make a decision to do the Fourth Step Inventory, a personal housecleaning which entails vigorous action.

Resentment is the number one killer of any alcoholic. And in Step Four an alcoholic pursues the questions of who and what he is resentful toward, and what are the underlying causes of his resentments. Unreasonable fear, anger and sexual misconduct are usually the problems. But also it's important to consider our selfishness, dishonesty, our self-centeredness and inconsideration. Who did we hurt? When were we jealous?

The "Into Action" chapter of the Big Book it states we "continue to watch for selfishness." This seems to be the root of all our problems, our selfishness and self-centeredness caused us to bombard our problems with the powers of our will. As alcoholics, it's not that we lack willpower, but we are power drivers seeking to control others around us.

Steps Three and Four are necessary to be in the program of AA. Meetings are separate. Same with anniversaries, dinners, dances, parties, picnics. Those things are personal ego. When group anniversaries are celebrated, you should get the best person possible to communicate how the group has helped AA carry its message. Don't rely on dinners and dances to do that, that's only fellowshipping. Reliance on parties, dances, picnics and dinners to carry the AA message is putting personalities before principles.

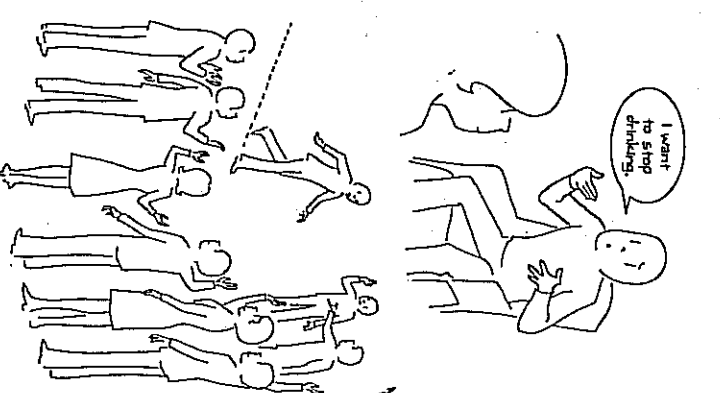
