One serious public relations calamity could always turn thousands away from us to perish a matter of life and death indeed!

So the Eleventh Tradition stands sentinel over the lifelines, announcing that there is no need for self-praise, that it is better to let our friends recommend us, and that our whole public relations policy, contrary to usual customs, should be based upon the principle of attraction rather than promotion. Shot-in-the-arm methods are not for us - no press agents, no promotional devises, no big names. The hazards are too great. Immediate results will always be illusive because easy shortcuts to notoriety can generate permanent and smothering liabilities.

When I first walked through the doors of AA just the mention of God would send the hairs on the back of my neck vibrating. I didn't want anything to do with anyone elses. God. To my surprise AA did not demand I believe anything instead I was allowed to find a God of my own understanding. Today I realized that my relationship with the God of my own understanding is the most precious gift AA could have ever given me. AA allowed me to find a God I not only could live with but cherish with all my heart.

My journey of sobriety included developing a philosphy of living built upon the quote from the Big Book found on page 83—"The spiritual life is not a theory. We have to live it." Talking a program is useless unless you put it into action by living it moment by moment. This quote gave me a centering point for my spiritual development. I found if I viewed everything in my life as being spiritual it became easier to live one day at a time letting go and letting God. Spirituality, for me, gives everything a purpose with a meaning, connecting everything to everything else.

Having God in my life allows me to feel I am exactly where I am supposed to be for today, doing exactly what I am supposed to be doing, and if I make an error in judgment it isn't final but a learning experience.

In a pamphlet by Veronica Ray called "I Have Choices', she states, "Life is full of decisions, choices, problems, errors, setbacks, and obstacles. We must find our happiness in life as it is. There will will never be a more perfect time to be happy than now. There will never be a better place for happiness than here.

None of use will ever make perfect choices. But that doesn't mean we can't be happy. It means that happiness isn't perfection it's acceptance, contentment, enjoyment, peace and growth. Just as we must live our lives here and now, we choose happiness here and now...because that's the only place and time we'll ever find it.

The Outstretched Hand by Pat S., Toledo, Ohio Grapevine - October 1974

A few days ago, I was delivering some typing to the ward of the mental hospital where I work. As I went toward the nurses' station, I noticed a small, elderly lady seated in a geriatric chair (somewhat like high chair on wheels). She stretched out her hand, palm up, whenever anyone passed by

The nurses and aides were all rushed; the doctor was with another patient; everyone seemed to be too busy to notice this small gesture. The lady had an orange on the tray in front of her, but she paid no attention to it. She just seemed to be waiting for something, or someone.

I delivered my work and was ready to go back to my office, but something made me stop and look at her. As I did, the hand was outstretched once more, without word or change of expression. Just the hand, palm up.

I could not pass her without taking her hand! I didn't know what to say, but I knew I had to take her hand in mine, so I did. She smiled and spoke of how cool my hand felt, and asked whether I would share her orange. I promised to come back if I could. I did, and spent a few moments with her.

I have not seen the lady since, but I pray for her - that wherever and whenever her hand is outstretched again, someone will feel, as I did, unable to pass it by.

I also say a prayer of thanks for this opportunity to "practice these principles" in all my affairs. May I never forget that moment.

On Sunday, November 12, 1950, Bill went to Akron, Chie to visit Dr. Bob for the last time. After a few hours, Bill said good ju.

"I went down the steps and then turned to look back. Bob stood in the doorway, tall and upright as ever....This was my partner, the man with whom I never had a harsh word. The wonderful, old, broad smile was on his face as he said almost jokingly, 'Remember, Bill, let's not louse this thing up. Let's keep it simple!' I turned away unable to say a word. it was the last time I ever saw him."

Dr. Bob died at noon the following Thursday, November 15.

More and more, therefore, are we emphasizing the principle of personal anoity as it applies to our public relations. We ask of each other the highest of personal responsibility in this respect. As a movement we have been, before now, tempted to exploit the names of our well-known public We have rationalized that characters. other societies, even the best do the same. As individuals, we have sometime believed that the public use of our names could demonstrate our personal courage in the face of stigma, so lending power and conviction to news stories and magazine articles.

But these are not the allures they once were. Vividly, we are becoming aware that no member ought to describe himself in full view of the general public as an AA, even for the most worthy purpose, lest a perilous precedent be set which would tempt others to do likewise for purposes not

so worthy.

We see that on breaking anonymity by press, radio, or pictures, any one of us could easily transfer the valuable name of AA over into any enterprise or into the midst of any controversy.

So it is becoming our code that there are things that no AA ever does lest he divert AA from its sole purpose and injure our pubic relations. And thereby the chance of

those sick ones yet to come.

To the million alcholics who have not yet heard our AA story, we should ever say, "Greetings and welcome. Be assured that we shall never weaken the lifelines which we float out to you. In our public relations, we shall, God willing, keep the faith".

GOD AS I DESIRE HIM Grapevine August 1977

Around the tables, strength of character and purpose, love of life, joy, and serentity are but a few of the benefits flowing from the AA program. Too ofter, however, the beneficiaries of AA begin to forget how and from where they gained such gifts. One AA meeting and soon many meetings are put aside for this study, that religion, and the other new mediation group. Defore long, the inevitable drunk occurs.

When I was asked why I didn't hear so often from a certain friend, I explained that so-and-so had found religion and didn't need AA. Now, so-and-so has abandoned both AA and religion, to pursue a fantasy: "I really wasn't an alcoholic; so I can drink socially." Over and over, my life is filled with examples of where adherence or nonadherance to the AA program leads.

As AA has matured me, my concept of a Higher Power has grown and changed. It is a sweet-tasting experience to awake sober knowing that God has an immense storehouse of joy at my disposal, to be used this day to whatever degree I wish, so long as I don't take the first drink.

AA and my practice of its program have led me, not only to God as I understand Him, but also to God as I desire Him. The more I want my sobriety, the more of it I get, and the greater my sobriety, the more I desire to be closer to God. My relationship with God grows warmer and closer, because I want Him, and with this comes prosperity (not in the material sense only) beyond the wildest dream. Yet this desire is fed only by close attention to working the AA steps in all my affairs, for without AA I would have nothing.

With the 1991 <u>Buffalo Fall Convention</u> just weeks away - we are not only dealing with the final preparations for this year's but anticipating 1992 and 1993! The Steering Committee met on Tuesday, October 1st with the Chairman and Co-Chairman of the '92 and '93 conventions to formulate ideas and suggestions. This being our first experience with the Convention Center we want to see how it fits our needs and, if we will again use their facilities. With this in mind we felt it productive to start canvasing the Buffalo downtown and surrounding area hotels/motels for prices and accommodations. The committee has really had "an awakening"!

Pat T., Chairperson for the '93 Buffalo Fall Convention has been in contact with hotel managers and her meeting with them has brought to light some disturbing reactions to accommodating Alcoholics Anonymous.

The results of her discussions are as follows: One hotel will not consider having the convention at there facility again. Another hesitated, but stated that they would only consider us, if we agree to a list of definite regulations.

Poor conduct, having to escort people out of the facility, damage to the facility, foods being brought in that were against hotel policy of only "fingerfoods" were some of the complaints given.

Most facilities requested that all in attendance be required to wear badges.

What the committee has found even more disturbing is the impression that we as members of A.A. are presenting to the public. We can say – "live and let live" and ignore what is being said – but it is the opinion of the Steering Committee that we must address this issue. Our Step 10 suggests a daily inventory of ourselves – now we need to apply this to A.A. "as a whole" in Buffalo WNY area for conventions and meeting places.

Members Note

On Thursday, September 12, 1991, I arrived at the Eric County Home and Infirmary at 7:05 p.m. for the Never Too Late Group meeting which starts at 7:30 p.m. I put on the water for the instant coffee and tea, then I set up the tables for the meeting. Then I waited for some one to show for the meeting – No one came – so I had a meeting with myself and my Higher Power and read the Big Book. At 8:30 I cleaned-up and went home.

Many a time, I was told by one the resident gentlemen of the Home would tell me that I was crazy for being there in the hot weather or on a holiday. I told him I had to be there if someone needed my help the way AA people helped me when I first came into the fellowship.

I started to come here in the begining of April, 1986 and received a lot of help and suggestions as on how to live a life without alcohol. I have had a few one-on-one meetings here that were great. You seem to open more that way, I have been able to take the good with the bad but I do wish that more people would show up at this meeting to help keep it going strong. I hate to see another meeting being taken off the schedule for lack of support. We are the hands of AA and we are responsible to show other alcoholics that are sick and suffering that there is a way.

But, in the end, our seeking always brings a finding. These great mysteries are, after all, enshrined in complete simplicity. The willingness to grow is the essence of all spiritual development."

Letter Written by Bill, 1958.

"Among AA's there is still a vast amount of mix-up respecting what is material and what is spiritual. I prefer to believe that it is all a matter of motive. If we use our worldly possessions too selfishly, then we are materialist. But if we share these possessions in helpfulness to others, then the material aids the spiritual

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Before we came to AA Christmas time was for all the parties. Gifts from the company, friends. Now that we are not drinking today in early sobriety. great tiding of joys can we find. A friend of mine before a Sunday night meeting gave me a great suggestion...why not attend the AA Christmas Vigil. He told that young and old people of all color and lifestyles would meet together to share plus passing 'it' on; and that could help me live one day at a time without picking up that first drink and I would not be around people who don't understand alcoholism. He told me I could celebrate the Christmas season by helping out - by setting up places for the lonely and those people still trying to get a hold on the AA progam. He asked me to go to my home group and request donations for coffee and food for the Vigil. That evening in December I met a person from out of town by himself miles from any family or old friends. greeted each other Happy Holiday and living sober.

He was friendly but you could tell he felt alone. I said lets have a cup of coffee and talk. I think we needed each other this After the meal and the AA program night. his face had a smile and with a grin said..."this is one of my best Christmases and it came when I was sober." I agreed with him but the spiritual awakening can come one more time. Just being with my new found friend, we are still in contact with each other. I just got a letter form him and his question is Buffalo still going to have a Christmas Vigil? Because to him it was a day of Good Tiding and has helped him one day at a time. If you want tidings of great joy joy attend the Christmas Vigil (for yourself) and don't forget to have your home group donate a little money to defray expenses.


