IRREPARABLE DAMAGE TO THE REPUTATION OF AA AS A WHOLE

Bad news travels fast!

I am saddened, ashamed and offended. It is very sad day indeed, when the pastor of a Church has to confront the members of a long established AA Group, and remind them that the Church is a place of **worship**, and not a **barroom**. The Church members were tired of having to put up with all the cursing and swearing and watching people flip their cigarette butts on the ground and walk away. (This doesn't happen to spiritually fit groups.)

The slovenly dress code and uncaring attitude of those attending the AA meeting resulted in the Pastor of the church issuing an ultimatum to the group. The group had two weeks to clean up their act or they would no longer be allowed to hold an AA meeting there.

It has been a few twenty-four hours since God picked me up off the barroom floor, and carried me to Alcoholics Anonymous. Many people at tables have heard me say: "I must have been out getting drunk somewhere, when they handed out the rules on how to have a normal life. I had no idea of how not to drink, one day at a time!"

I discovered with the help of God and the old timers in AA, that I was wrong about most everything and had developed a 'warped sense of reality' through the use and abuse of alcohol.

The old-timers taught me that I had to: 'clean up', 'dress up' and 'show up!' This meant that I had to take care of my personal hygiene every day, you know, wash myself, and my clothes instead of putting on my cleanest dirty shirt. I had to show up at an Alcoholics Anonymous meeting an hour early, to help set up that meeting that God had allowed me to attend, instead of sitting in the parking lot hoping someone else would do 'my work' for me.

At the 'meetings before the meeting' I learned a lot about living the sober life. I learned all about practicing the spiritual principles in all my affairs. I took home what I had learned at AA meetings and put it to work in my everyday life, both in and outside of AA.

The old timers **showed** me, by the power of example, that whenever Alcoholics Anonymous

used a facility for a meeting it was always left cleaner than they found it!

Alcoholics Anonymous has one primary purpose, and that is to carry the message to the still sick and suffering **alcoholic**, not to the druggie, nor to various and sundry other human problems. AA is not a dating service, marriage/relationship counseling service, job bank, money lending institution. We **don't** give advice or tell others how to run their lives. We have enough trouble trying to run our own lives sober. When we sponsor the newcomer in AA, we help them through the Steps and make **suggestions** only, as we are not qualified to tell them anything about running their private lives. We cannot issue threats to our sponsees telling them they must do it or else they will lose us as a sponsor. We must be very cautious in what we say and do to the newcomer, remember we are not counselors we are just another drunk trying to stay sober 'one day at a time.'

As the early members of AA learned, AA cannot or should not be all things to all people. Hence we can only deal with alcoholism. To do otherwise, we would surely go the way of all other groups that have tried to deal with alcoholism.

This is a program of recovery, not slips! This is about being a recovered alcoholic. (AA chapter 2, page 17, 'There is a solution.') Recovery is in doing and living all the Twelve Steps, not just 1, 2, 12. It took me a long time to learn that I had to go ahead and do things in AA, then I found the reasons and benefits late of such actions.

The other day, a young man fairly new to the AA program called me a "big book thumping' AA-er." My answer to him was: "Thank you, I used to be a sloppy ass drunk."

WHEN ANYONE, ANYWHERE REACHES OUT...

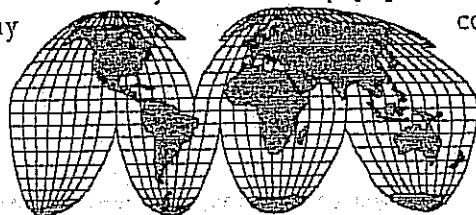
I have had many occasions in sobriety to travel overseas. I have seen many places and been to many countries. The magic of AA has always been there. Long forgotten are the names of the castles and museums I have seen but the places and the faces at the AA meetings abroad are still vivid memories.

I married a fellow AA who had migrated here from Northern Ireland. He had taken a long geographical cure, leaving his homeland, but of course, taking himself with him. He was estranged from his family back home. We had the opportunity to go back to Ireland, where he was able to take Step 9 with his remaining family members. I also remember going to meetings in the Protestant section, (my husband was Catholic). It was no different than going to any AA meeting anywhere, showing again that AA transcends all man made barriers.

When we were in the Irish Republic, we called the answering service and arranged to meet a gentleman in front of a pub in Galway. At that time, there were no separate units in the hospitals for alcoholics, so we went to visit a young man who actually was in a geriatric unit. I recall watching him sitting on the bed and talking to my husband, and the picture of the "Man on the Bed" flashed through my mind. The man had been so drunk the night before that he jumped into the river which goes through Galway.

We have traveled to the Scandinavian countries. In one meeting in Norway, they stopped the discussion meeting in Norwegian and switched to English just for us. In Sweden, a handicapped lady who was attending an English speaking meeting, got us a ride with her in a taxi to the train station. Handicapped people ride free in Sweden. In Denmark, a woman at an English speaking meeting said she liked going to them because she felt closer to the founders by speaking and reading English.

Traveling in Australia, we found many more AA coincidences. In Melbourne, we used



a pay phone on the street to call AA. We connected with a tape and the pronunciation of the street names was unfamiliar to us. So we called the Al-Anon number. A lady answered and told us to stay at that phone. A man called and directed us to a meeting that was just off a tram stop. At a meeting in Cairns, near the Great Barrier Reef, the people knew a man they called "Buffalo Bill." He was from our hometown and had lived in Australia for a while.

In the Yukon, we were walking around the town and passed by a church with a truck parked outside with a bumper sticker on it. We surmised that there was an AA meeting inside. It turned out to be an Al-Anon meeting. The owner of the truck promptly took us to the AA meeting. Her husband was at that meeting and directed us to a loner who lived on the Alaskan/Yukon border. The nearest meeting to him was three hundred miles away.

Recently, I had the occasion to go to the Ukraine to work at an English language camp. Two other people from the program were in my group. We went to a meeting in a man's home. They cannot afford to rent a hall for their meetings. He was receiving the Grapevine and Box 459.

The director of the camp has a husband with a drinking problem. When I got home, I sent her the Big Book and the Twelve and Twelve in the Ukrainian language. I don't know if he is sober yet, but I know that she had read the books.

There is nothing like the feeling of knowing that, when you travel anywhere, "AA will always be there." The joy of meeting fellow AA's around the world is really indescribable. The serenity and security of knowing that the program is there and working in virtually all countries and all languages is a priceless gift from God and this Fellowship.

May God bless us all now, and forever.

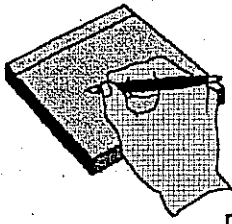

Step 10. "Continued to take personal inventory and when we were wrong promptly admitted it."

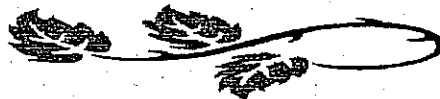


We need to take a daily inventory because we (hopefully) are growing daily. If we are working the steps daily, we are growing daily, hence making mistakes daily, and there we have the need to make adjustments. "Do we admit our wrongs promptly?" Unless we admit them promptly, we will store these wrongs, which can be rationalized into "wrongs against us." They may become resents, which sabotage our

recovery. (Steps to Serenity, p 69.) My word, that does sound like a familiar cycle. Cunning, baffling and powerful. How many times have we turned our wrong into somebody else's, left unchecked, built up a fierce anger, end of story we scream at the other- 'it's all your fault' and then drink "to show them", whew, that wore me out just thinking about it, easier softer way here is to promptly admit the wrong, and move on, don't even brood over it.



Long Form Tradition 10. "No A.A. Group or member should ever, in such a way as to implicate A.A., express any opinion on outside controversial issues--particularly those of politics, alcohol reform, or sectarian religion. The Alcoholics Anonymous groups oppose no one. Concerning such matters they can express no views whatever." For simpler reasons, here is the short form: "Alcoholics Anonymous has no opinion on outside issues; hence the AA name ought never be drawn into public controversy." This comes very hard to alcoholics who always had an opinion on everything and their way was the only way. It is very hard for them not to 'act' on behalf of AA. To pronounce that they are alcoholic and this is how we do things here (the world according to drunk). I heard once that the best thing I could do for AA was to just leave it the way I found it. In public it is generally best to keep to yourself about who and what you are. Leave the public information to those who have volunteered to do it, and have learned the correct way to do it. All those opinions we have mean 'dodo'; and in fact, those opinions may get is drunk. Once again is it ego? More than likely it is. It has been, every time I had a better way to do things.



"It is no coincidence that the first Step mentions powerlessness. An admission of personal powerlessness over alcohol is a cornerstone of the foundation of recovery. I've learned that I do not have the power and control over what people think of me. I am powerless over having just missed the bus. I am powerless about how people think of me. I am powerless over how people work (or don't

work) the Steps. But I've learned I am not powerless over some things. I am not powerless over my attitudes. I am not powerless over negativity. I am not powerless over assuming responsibility for my own recovery. I have the power to exert a positive influence on myself, my loved ones, and the world in which I live."

The program of Alcoholics Anonymous is the twelve steps. The steps are suggested it is said, yet few stay sober without taking them. The fellowship is made

up of the recovering alcoholics who practice these steps. The actions we take to bring us to the taking of the steps do vary to a degree with the individual. We have different sponsors, home groups and regular meetings. Some of us are active in AA, others not. Some of us are talkers and some of us (thank God) prefer to listen. There are differences in our approach to taking the 12 steps but the steps are the only program.

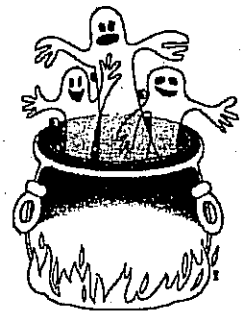
