## Principle: The Value of an Apology

One of the first thoughts that went through my mind in the early sobriety days was how many times I apologized - well, said "I was sorry" - and then repeated the same action I apologized for. Was it hundreds of times? It was a lot.

How does apologizing become valuable? I've said it so many times that the words "I'm sorry" became worthless. I certainly could not expect anyone to believe me.

What is an apology, anyway? Is it just saying I'm sorry? Is it making amends (like our Steps Eight and Nine), which is more like paying someone back for trouble I caused?

Consider our society today. The last time someone cut <u>you</u> off driving - did they apologize? Did they communicate using sign language instead?

How many people do you know that will try and put blame on others, so it's 'not their fault', & therefore never have to apologize? Do you have a boss who never makes a mistake? Maybe a spouse? People sue others these days because they were "wronged", whether purposely or not.

I looked up a few words to get us on the same page with definitions. First, the word apology: "An acknowledgement of some fault, injury, insult, etc., with an expression of regret and a plea for pardon."

The next word is <u>amend</u>: "To make better; improve; to remove

the faults of; to correct; to change or revise."

I also looked up <u>remorse</u>: "A strong feeling of guilt and regret over a wrong one has done."

Guilt means "an awareness of or responsibility for having done wrong or committed a crime, accompanied by feelings of shame and regret."

The last word, is <u>sorry</u>: "full of sorrow, pity, or sympathy; feeling or expressing regret for an action that has upset or inconvenienced somebody."

For the language connoisseurs (I'm NOT), also notice that "sorry and remorse" have feelings as part of their definition. Apology and remorse are nouns, usually for people, places, or things. Amend is a verb – which usually implies action. Sorry is an adjective, which describes a noun. So "sorry" is how you feel about something you need to apologize for or have remorse for, and the way you do it (the action part) is the amend.

Another way of looking at it is "how do we get rid of the guilt, shame, and remorse" that weigh us down? Make an amend.

Are you like me? I said I was sorry for my behavior while I was drinking, during my drinking and now sober. It was true - I really <u>felt</u> sorry about some of my actions. And, sorry is just a feeling. Sorry was the perfect word, because I wasn't ready to change my life, let alone admit that alcohol was the problem.

Fr. Ralph: "Apology is for weaklings and cowards. Such was the motto in the drinking days of the alcoholic, or even before his drinking days. In fact there was never anything to apologize for. Wasn't everybody else wrong; and were not we always right?

"In A.A., we learn that it is necessary to be diligent in our mental hygiene; that apology, when apology is in order, is a necessary part of mental keeping house; that to omit such MIGHT, just MIGHT cause serious drink cravings even on the level of the subconscious. It has happened!"

So what happens when we make an apology, or basically tell someone else we have remorse regarding one of our actions? What is in it, or what is the value, to me, and to another person?

First, we simply admit we are capable of making mistakes. If I'm perfect (HA!), I'd never have to apologize. Coupled with that, I find I can't read other's minds, no matter how hard I try. That means I could be doing something I think is helpful, while in fact it may be hurtful.

We do not expect others to be perfect, either. We are a work in process, and so are our fellow A.A. members, as well as everyone else on the planet. I'm not perfect, so why should I expect perfection is others.

Is apologizing something we are normally inclined to do? How many times can we think of in the past when we should have said something, but re-

mained silent. "They will understand," we said to ourselves. "They are a fellow A.A. member so they know what it is like," and a hundred other excuses we used. It seems to me that I stopped saying I was sorry and started making apologies after learning how to do it from other A.A. members.

Last, making an apology will show others that we are genuinely concerned with their welfare, and not just a selfish person playing "it's all about me." Everyone has been on the receiving end of a true apology. Isn't that feeling just weird, maybe because it happens so rarely?

Fr. Ralph has a good story to close with: "John Doe hadn't had a drink for six years in A.A. He suddenly one day got a terrific craving for one. And in spite of all he could do and no matter how much or how often he "talked it out" with other members, it still remained — day in

and day out, hour in and hour out, minute in and minute out. Frantically and frightened he kept seeking advice. Then one day an A.A. came up with the question:

"Was there by chance anything or anyone that you deliberately LEFT OUT OF YOUR MAKING AMENDS? Was there anyone to whom you WILL-FULLY REFUSED TO APOLOGIZE?

"John thought hard. Suddenly he stammered, 'Yes, it was my brother-in-law, the so-and-so, BUT HE WAS TO BLAME! And even as late as two weeks ago he wrote me a snooty letter! Why, that...hey...two weeks ago, why that was the day this thing began!'

"His friend looked straight at him, grinned, and said 'Well, what are we waiting for? Where does this brother-in-law live?' "It was a long trip. John took a plane. He went to his brother-in-law's office. He apologized asking no corners. And to this day he has had no further craving for a drink. This is a true story! 'When wrong, promptly admitted it...'

"Made DIRECT amends..."

Did you catch that — 'took a plane'? This was back in the 50', when it wasn't cheap to hop a plane. It adds definition to the phrase 'any lengths'. How about you? How do you describe 'any lengths'?

## Life as a Series of Habits and Routines

As a young person I'm supposed to be adventurous -- willing to go new places and try new things (have no fear). I suppose that I am open to this idea. The actual "how often I do it" is open to question.

The young are out to conquer and trail blaze. Our culture is selling as conventional wisdom that older generations are stuck in their ways. Indeed, my experience has shown me that daily routines are quite fixed for the majority of my more advanced (in years, that is) family members and acquaintances. Repetition and routine remain, because they are successful. This assumes that the repeated behaviors (or habits) are beneficial.

My nature as an alcoholic contributes to what causes me to repeat the same actions again and again, regardless of the inevitable unsuccessful outcomes. Have you ever heard "do the same thing and expecting different results?" I am glad to return to this space. It is familiar. I've continued to be a standard bearer for procrastination.

This year my summer habit has been to over-work and under-sleep for a day or two. That is followed by a day of oversleeping and accomplishing little while scrambling in attempts to feed myself, shower, and make it to work or live up to my other responsibilities.

I've been attending about 3 or 4 meetings every two weeks. I've gotten out of the habit of regular bedside prayer twice daily. I am most fortunate to still be among the sober today.

Commitment to my home group, contact with my sponsor and a few other sober alcoholics has been my connection to what provides the life I now have. Habits and routine of course have an equally positive effect on my life, now that they are not of the destructive nature. I am used to dealing with life sober now. Not drinking each day has ceased to be a struggle. It has not been sexy, nor always fun. My life is down right boring much of the time. Mentally I'm trying to catch up to where my body is physically.

The myths about the carefree nature of youth do not interest me today. My choice is to pursue a stable, decent life - which I'm told leads to becoming happy, joyous and free!

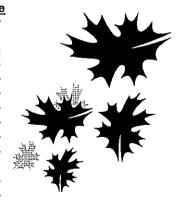

## The Requirements for each position are as Follows:

## Section 1a. Co-CHAIRPERSON

The Chairperson shall be elected by a simple majority vote of the Central Committee representatives present and voting at the meeting designated for the election of officers. Qualifications for Chairperson shall be that he or she be a member of Alcoholics Anonymous having a minimum of five (5) continuous years of sobriety immediately preceding the date of the election. The Co- Chairperson shall hold office for one (1) year. Upon conclusion of the Co-Chairperson's year in service, that officer shall move into the office of Chairperson in the month of January.

## Section 1b. RECORDING SECRETARY

The Recording Secretary shall be elected by a simple majority vote of the Central Committee representatives present and voting at the meeting designated for the election of officers. Qualifications for Recording Secretary shall be that he or she be a member of Alcoholics Anonymous having a minimum of two (2) years of continuous sobriety immediately preceding the date of the election. The Recording Secretary shall hold office for one (1) year but may be eligible for re-election.

## Section 2 RECORDING SECRETARY

- 1. It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary to transmit to the Central Committee all resolutions or other communications pertaining to the business of the Central Committee.
- 2. The minutes of all meetings of the Central Committee shall be noted, transcribed and reported by the Recording Secretary.

## Section 1. STEERING COMMITTEE

This committee shall be composed of eight (8) members. Each member shall represent a designated number of groups based upon geographic boundaries as drawn by the Chairperson of the Central Committee with the advice and consent of the Central Committee.

## Section 1a.

Qualifications for membership shall be that he or she be a member of Alcoholics Anonymous having a minimum of three (3) continuous years of sobriety preceding the date of election. these members should be elected from their own districts.

## Section 1b.

The term of office for each member shall be two (2) calendar years from the date of the member's election. Members can be re-elected at a later date. Nominations for membership on this committee are to be made at the Central Committee meetings held in the months of January, March, July and November. Elections are to be held at the Central Committee meetings in the months of February, April, August and December. Elected members are to assume office immediately. Whenever vacancies occur on the Committee for any reason, such unexpired term or terms shall be filled by a qualified member of AA named by the Steering Committee and subject to the approval of the Central Committee. Upon fulfillment of this unexpired term, the appointee shall be eligible for election to the Steering Committee.

### Section 2a.

The Steering Committee's primary purpose is to oversee AA matters where the individual groups' action may affect either groups in the area or AA as a whole. It also follows through with any recommendations made by the Central Committee and make suggestions and recommendations to the Central Committee.
