## Are We Self-Supporting Through Our Own Contributions?

I believe in AA. I believe it when I hear, when we straighten out spiritually, the mental and physical will soon follow. I believe that when I adhere and practice these 41 principles in ALL my affairs that I will be successful in all three areas of my life; mentally, physically and spiritually. I believe it, yet I still have difficulty doing so. I have experienced some success in all three of these areas of living.

The physical, sexual, financial, emotional, mental and social are the areas of the soul which can be measured to prove life's progress through inventory work.

I would like to figure out just how I can, for instance, have a prudent reserve for my personal life. I caught myself saying, 'figure it out', then a red flag shot up. I did not figure out these Steps on my own nor did I figure out the Traditions. I had a guide through them. Sponsors show us precisely how they recovered. Service sponsors show us how we of AA follow the Traditions in our groups and AA as a whole. Who then can show us how to apply the Concepts to our own lives?

That is the burning question for me and some of my closest friends. We would like to practice these principles and become successful in all areas of life.

Here are the results of our accumulative thoughts:

Be generous in all my affairs and give wherever possible.

Save ten percent of all I bring in, as well as giving ten percent of all I bring in. The flow of money will be blocked off if there is not an outgoing as well as an incoming.

Work as often and as long as possible being fair and just in all my dealings.

When given a choice of comfort or character building, choose character.

When given a choice of money, prestige, or principles, choose principles.

Love at all times. • Give at all times. • Be fair always. • Just do it!

What an order! I cannot go through with it! It reminds me of the Ten Commandments; I cannot maintain anything like perfect adherence to those principles either. Perhaps a commitment to, and accountability toward others, is the key to success... Without help it is too much for us!

What is the point? – The point is that we are willing to grow along spiritual lines. We can claim spiritual progress not spiritual perfection.

I reluctantly have begun to practice these principles in my financial life... although I felt hopeless before I even trying. Slowly but surely I have completed many things in AA. Therefore, hope faintly arises just beyond the horizon of my life, giving me just enough motivation to try one more day or just one more time.

It is just like the program – not easy. SIMPLE. We are not going to lose or be losers when we continue to make the effort, take action, and don't quit one day or one moment at a time.

Steadfastness, consistency, continuity, painstaking action, tenacity and perseverance will always have their payoffs in the long run, for constant vigilance is the price we pay to gain a new way of living we call AA.

## Anger – The Killer Emotion ~Reprinted w/permission; Digital Reporter, Washington Area Intergroup

Anger, in all its aspects, is a universal human problem. But it poses a special threat to alcoholics: Our own anger can kill us. Recovered alcoholics almost unanimously agree that hostility, grudges or resentments often make us want to drink, so we need to be vigilant against such feelings. We have found much more satisfying ways than drinking for dealing with them. Here is a look at some of the guises anger seems at times to arrive in: intolerance, contempt, envy, hatred, snobbishness, rigidity, cynicism, discontent, tension, sarcasm, self-pity, malice, distrust, anxiety, suspicion, jealousy.

Various A.A. members have, when sober, been able to trace all those feelings to some underlying anger. During our drinking days, many of us spent little time thinking such things out. We were more likely to brood about them, or to overreact, especially after we heightened such feelings by taking another drink.

Perhaps fear should be on that list too, because many of us believe anger is frequently an outgrowth of fear. We're not always sure what we're afraid of; sometimes it is just a vague, generalized, nameless fear. And it can give rise to an equally generalized anger, which may suddenly focus on something or someone.

Feelings of frustration also can give birth to anger. As a class, problem drinkers are not famous for a high tolerance level when faced with frustration, real or imaginary. A drink used to be our favorite solvent for such an indigestible emotion.

Perhaps "justifiable" resentment is the trickiest of all to handle. It's the end product of "righteous" anger, after long cherishing, and if it is allowed to continue, it will slowly undermine our defenses against taking a drink.

Even if we have been treated shabbily or unjustly, resentment is a luxury that, as alcoholics, we cannot afford. For us, all anger is self-destructive, because it can lead us back to drinking.

We have found that we must learn to sublimate our anger lest it kills us.

Ross here, alcoholic, and sober today thanks to A.A. and a loving Power greater than myself.

I love this quotation by Bill from the 12 & 12, in fact when I came in many moons ago I was struck by the phrase "we drank to dream greater dreams" because when I was drinking I used to love to sit out the end of a pier and watch the beacon light go on and off, as I drank my vodka in a paint-stained glass (I had images of myself as a famous artist), and I did indeed "dream greater dreams" fantasizing about what I would do and where I would live in the future. I also got to the end stage of drinking in Lisbon, Portugal in 1972 where I was seeking "oblivion". There used to be a show in those days called "Stop the world (I want to get off!)", and that was me!

When I came into the Melbourne Young People's group in 1973, they emphasized that "filthy dirty rotten pride will kill you!" but I couldn't see the low self-esteem coupled with inflated ego that I was suffering with. When you're in pride, you can't really see it. When I was forced as what I used to like to call myself - a "militant atheist" - to call out for help to the stars with that phrase I never knew was being repeated all over the world of "IF there is anything out there, please help me!" I finally suffered ego deflation at depth and realized I was finished. The jig was up. I surrendered. That declaration of hopelessness has made it easier ever since to return .- I am only sober today because my prayer was answered in the form of AA.

However, I am not one of those servile Mr. Heap characters from Dickens, crawling be- fore people "I am your humble servant, Sir!" AA has taught me to be teachable (Bill W.) and I love Dr. Bob's definition of humility, where he was able to go within and close the door and be alone with his Higher Power. It has taught me to have a realistic appreciation of my abilities and what I am good at but never forget where my sobriety comes from. Knowing that, it is difficult to be prideful, but I don't believe in completely emasculating the ego. There is a trend in meetings around here to say "when you enter AA, leave your personality at the door!" What does that mean? Am I supposed to castrate and emasculate myself and reduce the Big Book and the Program to a formulaic thing to be repeated by rote - A+B=C? I don't believe that - I believe the message is carried precisely by personality. It is how we each work our own individual Program that makes it so exciting.

I once heard a member share that ego is like the air in the tires of a car - if you have too much, you will have a blow-out, but if you don't have enough, the car won't run. Many of us come into AA so beaten up with guilt, remorse and physical/mental/spiritual suffering that we need a bit of air in the tires to get up and have a "go" at life. Don't take that away from us!





## Central Committee Minutes -- 9/13/15

Meeting was opened at 8:00pm by Dianne with the responsibility statement and a moment of silence followed by the serenity prayer. The AA Preamble was read by Christina (Williamsville Group), 12 Traditions were read by Rollie (Orchard Park Step), Purpose of Central Committee was read by Augustin (Three Legacies)

A beautiful dissertation of the ninth tradition was provided by Jeff (Derby Group), it was very informative and concise. Next month Rae Anne will speak of the 10<sup>th</sup> Tradition.

There were 24 groups represented. Broken down by zone: 1)None 2) Acceptance, Brass, How it Works, North Buffalo, Renaissance, Step Action Group, Three Legacies 3) Buffalo Group, Courage Group, Iron Horse, Thruway, Tuesday Women's discussion 4) Action Group, Orchard Park Step, 5) Lockport #1 6) Carrying the Message, Derby Group, Lakeshore, Sobriety Men's Discussion 7) Achievement, Amherst Snyder, East Amherst Traditions, Step it Up, Williamsville

Minutes were accepted by motion brought by Debbi and seconded by Joan.

#### Reports:

**Envelope System:** Envelope System – August 2015 We received only \$ 250.00 in donations this month. This amount was comprised of \$165 from our 7 monthly credit card donors and the balance, \$85, was donated by 3 monthly individuals. I have given information out at the Central Office meeting, at the Central office Inventory presentation, at individual home groups and even included flyers in last year's Fall convention packet. I'm at my wit's end, does the Central Office have any other suggestions to carry this message. If you would like more info on the envelope system please contact Sue B at

Steering Committee: Just met to discuss the inventory. No official report to provide at this time.

Financial: August 2015: Amounts rounded to the nearest \$1.00 except balances. Total Income: \$7,969. Literature sales were \$3,340. Group contributions were up, third highest amount this year at \$4,234. Total Expenses: \$10,234. Monthly Net: Negative \$2,265. The year to date is a negative \$13,179. Checking Account: balance is \$16,789.41. Petty Cash: balance is \$3,000. Prudent Reserve: with the interest bump is \$28,135.96. Inventory: Balance is \$15,914.49. This is the highest level for the year, normal for the month preceding the convention which included purchases in August of \$3,424. Corrections Committee: Balance is \$1,612.85. Contributions were \$50 and expenses were \$3. Treatment Committee: Balance is \$1,213.60. Contributions were \$150 & expenses were \$283. Group Accounts Receivable: Balance is \$446.51 from 7 groups, all current to 30 days. General Observation: our operating bank account balance (which does not include committee accounts or the prudent reserve) was \$29,969 on January 1st and is now \$19,789. I would not call it a trend at this time, but you might. Barring a catastrophe we will not have a problem this fiscal year. If this decline continues, 2016 may be a challenging year. 



- What would AA be without this Tradition? Where would I be?
- Do I breach this or any of its supporting Traditions in subtle, perhaps unconscious, ways?
- How can I manifest the spirit of this Tradition in my personal life outside AA? Inside AA?
