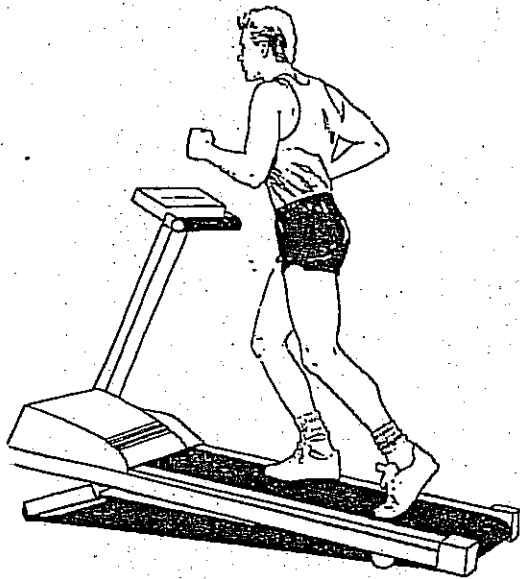

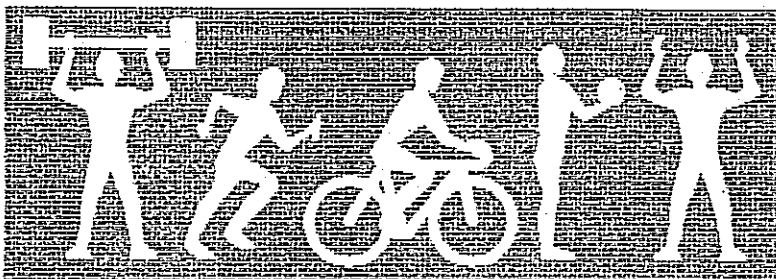
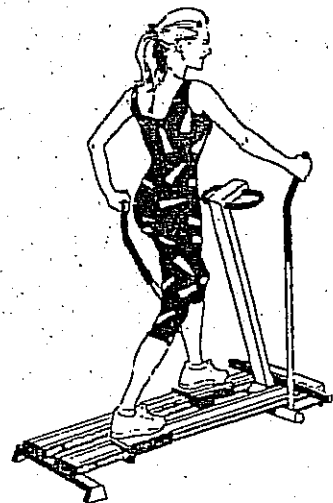

The following is an excerpt from a compilation of writings by Reverend Samuel Shoemaker, one of AA's earliest and most stalwart friends. As our co-founder, Bill W. said in Alcoholics Anonymous Comes of Age:

"Dr. Silkworth gave us the needed knowledge of our illness, but Sam Shoemaker had given us the concrete knowledge of what we could do about it. One showed us the mysteries of the lock that held us in prison; the other passed on the spiritual keys by which we were liberated." On describing Dr. Silkworth's talk at our 20<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Convention in St. Louis in 1955, Bill said, "Sam's appearance before us was further evidence that many a channel had been used by Providence to create Alcoholics Anonymous. And none had been more vitally needed than the one opened through Sam Shoemaker and his Oxford Group associates of a generation before. The basic principles which the Oxford Groupers had taught were ancient and universal ones, the common property of man. He will always be

found in our annals as the one whose inspired example and teaching did most to show us how to create the spiritual climate in which we alcoholics may survive and continue to grow. AA owes a debt of timeless gratitude for all that God sent us through Sam and his friends in the days of AA's infancy."

The language used by Dr. Shoemaker in this article reflects his religion and his conception of God, but, as Bill pointed out, the principles discussed are universal. It is reprinted here for that value. As the Big Book tells us "Be quick to see where religious people are right. Make use of what they offer."

Alcoholics Anonymous to me. She received no monetary compensation, but rather was paid by staying sober another day herself. Today I could ask for no payment other than another day free from alcohol, so in that respect, I am generously paid for my labor."

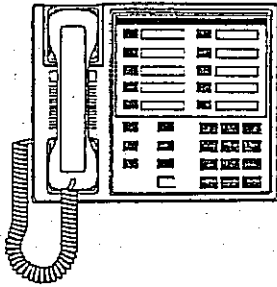

## WHERE HAVE 12-STEP VOLUNTEERS GONE?

The most frustrating thing about answering Central Office phones is not finding an AA member willing to take a Twelfth Step call for some sick alcoholic who has phoned us for help. Sometimes it takes up to 20 calls to get just one willing volunteer. Some of the responses we hear when a live member actually does answer the phone: "What's a Twelfth Step call?" "How did you get my phone number?" "Do you mean you actually want me to talk to someone who's still drinking?" The saddest response came from a member who exclaimed, "No I can't do it; I'm busy all day. Today is my sobriety anniversary." Other negative answers we get include: "The number has been disconnected." "I'm no longer a member of that group." "I don't attend meetings anymore."

But occasionally, something wonderful happens, as when we called upon an AA who answered our request for help by saying, "Thanks for calling me--I was really feeling down and sorry for myself. I'll make the Twelfth Step call immediately." One response like that offsets 500 of the negative kind and helps to keep us going.

The challenge of locating willing volunteers isn't new. It seems we had similar



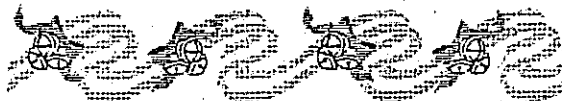
though less critical challenges years ago. Nor is the solution to the problem necessarily with the AA groups. Intergroup needs to educate the groups and their members about what we are and do. This need is confirmed by information our Intergroup receives from officers of our member groups.

Part of the solution lies in the power of repetition. AA being what it is. A fellowship with an astonishing turnover of people means that Intergroup needs to tell its own story continuously. It's no accident that AA is a program of repetition. I still want to hear another member remind me yet again, I don't have to drink. And it's the first drink that will get me drunk.

The need for volunteers and for updated Twelfth Step lists from individual groups is shared by the 499 Intergroups and Central Offices around the U.S. and Canada.

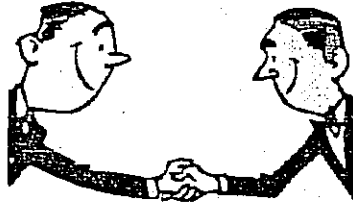
"Good judgement, a careful sense of timing, courage, and prudence--these are the qualities we shall need when we take Step Nine. Pg 83, 12&12

## ESCAPE FROM THE TRUTH

Alcoholism is a progressive incurable and often times fatal disease. The preferred escape from the truth of alcoholism is denial. To define escape; it simply means break from confinement, get free. I was born n alcoholic, I live as a recovering alcoholic and I'll die an alcoholic. However, I have embraced the Fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous and its teachings that give me a daily reprieve from my disease. If I avoid the first drink, I can't get drunk! AA not only provides me with a welcome change in my lifestyle, it also offered me a new perspective on spirituality. I was totally dependent on alcohol to do even the most trivial tasks. AA shattered the idea that I could handle it alone. I needed help. I have accepted my disease and realized that I cannot do it alone. Each morning I pray to the God of my understanding asking to better understand His will for me, not mine. I accept whatever I am given and do the best I can with what I have, one day at a time. The memories of my drinking do not include sipping expensive rum punch on the best beaches in Barbados. I gulped cheap booze in sleazy bars, staggered back to the mission, and mercifully passed out, only to awaken the next morning to another day of insanity.

There are no magic bullet cures for Alcoholism. At best, we may be able to identify

a high probability cause for these particular symptoms. Statistics tell us there are almost 3 million alcoholics in AA, and 18 million waiting in the wings. They wait for that right moment to quit, while persisting in that miserable way of life as a drinking alcoholic. I came to AA, full of self-pity, remorse and loneliness. The answer to all my problems was to drink. I drank to escape the reality of life, went to bed to escape, only to wake up the next morning to the horror of cold sweats and trembling hands wondering what I had done the night before.

AA taught me to surrender, so instead of trying to escape the truth, I surrendered to it. Out of defeat comes strength, and hope for a better way of life. I am overjoyed that if God, sees fit to keep me sober for one more day, my day will be rich and full in ways that I could not have imagined during the dark despair of my drinking days.

Escape from the truth? The truth is reality. There is no escape from reality; even soaked with alcohol, it is fleeting. We must surrender to our disease, and accept the reality of a loving God. Then and only then can we achieve some measure of success in our recovery.

### C.P.C. WORK AND WHY AA'S DO IT

"Cooperating with the nonalcoholic professionals is an effective way to carry the message to the sick alcoholic. Such people often meet the alcoholic in places where AA is not present. Through professionals, alcoholics may be reached who otherwise would never find the program, or they may be reached sooner with the help of informed non-AA's.

A professional can be a family doctor, or other health care professional, a member of the clergy, a law enforcement or court official, an educator, a social worker, an alcoholism or other counselor, or anyone who deals with problem drinkers in the course of their work. Many of these people often encounter the suffering alcoholic, and in spite of public awareness, many of them simply don't know what to do with a drunk.

C.P.C. work can begin when individual AA's reveal their membership to their doctors or drop a quiet word in the ear of a pastor, priest or rabbi that an AA member is available to the

congregation. Group participation in C.P.C. by welcoming professional and future professionals to open meetings. Committees in the area or local level actively seek ways to make contact with professional people and set up programs to increase knowledge and understanding of Alcoholics Anonymous.

A look at our history shows clearly that cooperation with professionals has been an integral part of the Fellowship since our beginnings. AA might never have gotten off the ground or progress would have been slower, without the help of non-alcoholics such as Dr. Silkworth, Sister Ignatia, and the Reverend Sam Shoemaker.

It is important that C.P.C. workers understand the importance of AA's Traditions and learn how to explain them to non-alcoholics. The cardinal fact is that the Traditions are our traditions and there is no reason non-AA's should be expected to understand them unless we take the initiative and explain them."

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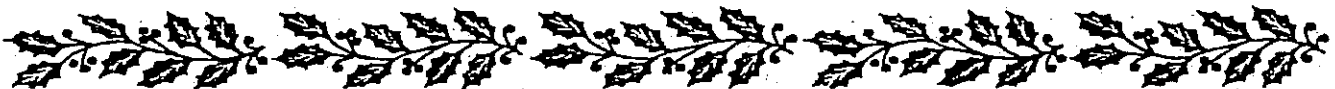
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### NEW FRONTIERS

### PSYCHIC CHANGE

"Men and women drink essentially because they like the effect produced by alcohol. The sensation is so elusive that, while they admit it is injurious, they cannot after a time differentiate the true from the false. To them, their alcoholic life seems the only normal one. They are restless, irritable and discontented, unless they can again experience the sense of ease and comfort which comes at once by taking a few drinks--drinks which they see others taking with impunity. After they have succumbed to the desire again, as so many do, and the phenomenon of craving develops they pass through the well-known stages of a spree, emerging remorseful, with a firm resolve not to drink

again. This is repeated over and over, and unless this person can experience an entire psychic change there is very little hope of his recovery.

On the other hand--and strange as this may seem to those who do not understand--once a psychic change has occurred, the very same person who seemed doomed, who had so many problems he despaired of ever solving them, suddenly finds himself easily able to control his desire for alcohol, the only effort necessary being that required to follow a few simple rules."
