## SEPTEMBER TOPICS OF DISCUSSION

**STEP 9: "Made direct amends to such people wherever possible, except when to do so would injure them or others."**

**"Good judgment, a careful sense of timing, courage, and prudence—these are the qualities we shall need when we take Step Nine." (pg. 83- 12x12)**

**"It is harder to go to an enemy than to a friend, but we find it much more beneficial to us. We go to him in a helpful and forgiving spirit, confessing our former ill feeling and expressing our regret." (pg. 77- Alcoholics Anonymous)**

- How do you know when you are using good judgment regarding amends or avoidance?
- What if intended recipient refuses to see or speak to me?
- What about all those \*&%+#'s who have wronged me?

**"Most of us begin making certain kinds of direct amends from the day we join Alcoholics Anonymous." (pg. 83- 12x12)**

- How soon after stopping drinking should we start to make amends?
- Are there guidelines to when to make amends?
  - Which ones should we deal with immediately?
  - What about partial restitution?
  - When should action be deferred?
  - What about those who have died?
  - What about my Husband/Wife and kids?
  - What is creative avoidance?

**"...we cannot buy our own peace of mind at the expense of others." (pg. 84 12x12)**

**"Under no condition do we criticize such a person or argue. Simply we tell him that we will never get over drinking until we have done our utmost to straighten out the past." (pg. 77 – Alcoholics Anonymous)**

**"His faults are not discussed. We stick to our own." (pg 78 – Alcoholics Anonymous)**

- Do I find others to blame for the decisions I have made?
- Do I lie to myself and others about how so and so misled me and took advantage of my good nature?
- Am I blind to how I have set the ball in motion in my life through magical and wishful thinking, claiming myself faultless?
- How has this affected those I have been involved with?
- Have my expectations of others been so unreasonably high that they had no choice but to disappoint me? How has that hurt them?

- Have I rationalized retaliatory behavior against those who disappoint me using gossip and constructive personality evaluation? How were they hurt?
- Am I truly ready to be free of the burdens of my unhealthy resentments?
- Am I ready to take full responsibility for my life?
- AM I TRULY READY TO MAKE DIRECT AMENDS FOR MY ACTIONS AND DISREGARD THE OTHER PERSON ENTIRELY?

"There can be only one consideration which should qualify our desire for complete disclosure of the damage we have done. That will arise in the occasional situation where to make a full disclosure would seriously harm the one to whom we are making the amends. Or—quite as important—other people." (pg. 86 – 12x12)

"Usually, however, other people are involved. Therefore, we are not to be the hasty and foolish martyr who would needlessly sacrifice others to save himself from the alcoholic pit."

- When drinking, or sober, we pursued an affair with a married woman/man, should we go to her husband/his wife and admit our fault even if they are unaware or there are children involved?
- We have taken shortcuts at work, do we risk the well being of our wives and children by reporting on ourselves or do we correct our behavior by becoming a good employee and repaying our employers through hard work and loyalty?
- We have fathered/mothered children from a one-time liaison and have never revealed this to our spouse or that child, do we now come clean and let the chips "fall where they may" or do we quietly repair the damage?
- Have I learned that not all situations can be righted and that I may just have to live in some unresolved discontent caused by my own aberrant behaviors?
- Am I willing to shoulder the responsibility for all my amends by not imposing hardship and hurt on my loved ones for a few fleeting moments of relief?
- What FREEDOM have I experienced by making direct amends wherever possible?

Tradition 9: "A.A., as such, ought never to be organized; but we may create service boards and committees directly responsible to those they serve."

"Power to direct or govern is the essence of organization everywhere.

Yet Alcoholics Anonymous is an exception. It does not conform to this pattern. Neither its General Service Conference, its Foundation Board, nor the humblest group committee can issue a single directive to an A.A. member and make it stick, let alone mete out any punishment." (pgs 172 + 173 – 12x12)

- Isn't this anarchy?
- How do we keep from falling apart?
- Who do we answer to?
- Does this mean I can just do whatever I want?

**“But long ago, trustees and staff members alike found they could do no more than make suggestions, and very mild ones at that...Of course you are at perfect liberty to handle this matter any way you please. But the majority experience in A.A. does seem to suggest...” (pgs 173+174 – 12x12)**

- **Is our cohesiveness born out of individual effort or group conformity to what is in the best interest of A.A. as a whole?**
- **How do I/we react to group conscience or the wealth of A.A.'s experience regarding our rights as a group? As an Individual?**
- **Do we, as a group, have a conscience or do personalities and rebellion dictate our activities?**

**“Unless there is approximate conformity to A.A.'s Twelve Traditions, the group, too, can deteriorate and die. So we of A.A. do obey spiritual principles, first because we must, and ultimately because we love the kind of life such obedience brings. Great suffering and great love are A.A.'s disciplinarians; we need no others.”(pg. 174 – 12x12)**

- **Has my group taken an inventory to see if we are keeping with the traditions?**
- **Are we truly an informed group?**
- **Do we discuss the traditions and the application of them in our group affairs?**
- **Do we, as a group, conform to the traditions and inter-group conscience or are we a divisive influence on A.A. as a whole?**
- **Are we interested in what is good for the whole of A.A. or our own agenda?**

**“Though Tradition Nine at first sight seems to deal with a purely practical matter, in its actual operation it discloses a society without organization, animated only by the spirit of service --- a true fellowship.” (pg 175- 12x12)**

- **Is the fellowship of A.A. safe from my group?**
- **Is the inter-group of this area interested in our common welfare and are they acting in A.A.'s best interest?**
- **Does my group participate in inter-group activities/meetings so we are an active voice in the fellowship?**
- **Do I participate in the spiritual practice of obedience to the greater good or am I more interested in being a rebellious big shot around A.A.**

**Concept 9: “Good service leadership at all levels is indispensable for our future functioning and safety. Primary world service leadership, once exercised by the founders, must necessarily be assumed by the trustees.”**

**Lately, I've been thinking...**

**Privilege- A special advantage, immunity, permission, right, or benefit granted to or enjoyed by an individual, class or caste. (Webster's Dictionary)**

**It is a privilege to participate and serve Alcoholics Anonymous at any level. From the lowliest trustee to the most celebrated coffee maker, the honor that comes from participating in Alcoholics Anonymous is reserved for very few of the sick and suffering alcoholics. It is estimated that three percent of alcoholics find recovery in A.A., and if I am sober today I am one**

of a very small number of privileged persons in receipt of this gift. My gratitude needs to be expressed in quiet actions and not words.

I truly wish I could report that I have always responded favorably when a privilege has been offered to me. I am one of those who grouches and complains first and reaps the benefit in hindsight. One who, at times, wants all the benefits that comes from service with minimal effort and sacrifice. I want to be remembered for my lofty intentions and occasional good deeds, not my erstwhile performance.

Because I am one of a privileged group I have a responsibility to defend my gift with fervor. I need to stand up and be counted, to express concern when the gift is threatened or misused. To redirect those who are endangering that privilege. The "Old Timers" used to say, "Stand for something or you will fall for anything." The question becomes, what is it I stand for? Is Alcoholics Anonymous a clearinghouse for all of today's socially unfit or is it a place for alcoholics to recover from an insidious disease? Is part of the insidiousness of that illness an unnatural need to always be politically correct and well thought of? Isn't that one of the very same defects of character that ruled my life when drinking? If political correctness is the goal of recovery then how can sobriety be a privilege if we have no expectation of conformity to the principles by the membership? The leadership of A.A. is in the hands of the groups. If a groups' message isn't clear then the recovery is questionable. Group conscience is a reflection of the very necessary leadership of A.A. If every group participated in the inter-group process (Central Committee) then our fellowship would truly reflect the combined wisdom and concerns of our privileged membership. Let's protect our privilege lest we lose it.

## When My Dad was Dying

Several years ago I began reading the stories at the back of the Big Book – one a night, before I went to sleep. Every time a doctor, nurse or whoever walked into the room he would say; "This is my daughter Debi. She used to have a problem with drugs & alcohol but she found God and AA, now she's fine."

Well there wasn't much anonymity in that statement, just a lot of pride & for me that was just fine.

## Singleness of Purpose and Problems Other Than Alcohol

Some professionals refer to alcoholism and drug addiction as "substance abuse" or "chemical dependency." Non-alcoholics are, therefore, sometimes introduced to A.A. and encouraged to attend A.A. meetings. Anyone may attend open A.A. meetings, but only those with a *drinking* problem may attend closed meetings.

A renowned psychiatrist, who served as a nonalcoholic trustee of the A.A. General Service Board, made the following statement: "Singleness of purpose is essential to the effective treatment of alcoholism. The reason for such exaggerated focus is to overcome denial. The denial associated with alcoholism is cunning, baffling, and powerful and affects the patient, helper, and the community. Unless alcoholism is kept relentlessly in the foreground, other issues will usurp everybody's attention."

## What Does A.A. Do?

1. A.A. members share their experience with anyone seeking help with a drinking problem; they give person-to-person service or "sponsorship" to the alcoholic coming to A.A. from any source.
2. The A.A. program, set forth in our Twelve Steps, offers the alcoholic a way to develop a satisfying life without alcohol.
3. This program is discussed at A.A. group meetings.

## What A.A. Does Not Do

A.A. does not:

1. Furnish initial motivation for alcoholics to recover
2. Solicit members

3. Engage in or sponsor research
4. Keep attendance records or case histories
5. Join "councils" of social agencies
6. Follow up or try to control its members
7. Make medical or psychological diagnoses or prognoses
8. Provide drying-out or nursing services, hospitalization, drugs, or any medical or psychiatric treatment
9. Offer religious services
10. Engage in education about alcohol
11. Provide housing, food, clothing, jobs, money, or any other welfare or social services
12. Provide domestic or vocational counseling
13. Accept any money for its services, or any contributions from non-A.A. sources
14. Provide letters of reference to parole boards, lawyers, court officials, social agencies, employers, etc.
