## Our Primary Purpose

Sometimes I am uncomfortable with all of the different definitions that I have heard concerning the topic of what our primary purpose is. I can sit in a meeting and hear all kinds of different experiences that members have described, thinking that they are carrying the message of alcoholics anonymous to the new member.

We have the big book, and the twelve and twelve, as our primary texts, that have the message that we are supposed to be carrying to the new comers. But I see it misrepresented by well meaning people that think we are supposed to convince a person not to take a drink.

I cringe when I hear someone say "*I just don't pick up today,*" and that it's all about the alcohol. It hasn't always been this way. This attitude has only surfaced in the past 25 years.

I sometimes think that it's almost sacrilegious to point these things out but I do it sometimes when someone's chance of sobriety hangs in the balance.

On page 31 in the big book, right after it explains "*all of the methods we have tried,*" it goes on to say, "*We do not like to pronounce any individual as alcoholic, but you can quickly diagnose yourself. Step over to the nearest bar and try some controlled drinking. Try to drink and stop abruptly. Try it more than once. It will not take long to decide if you are honest with yourself about it. It may be worth a bad case of jitters if you get the full knowledge of your condition.*"

Now, to be clear, I have never suggested that any- one go over to a bar and drink, but when I refer him to that page in the big book, he understands that he is the only one that can make the decision to stop drinking, and that I will help him to understand his problem but, I do not turn into his (parent) protector.

Again, I don't want to suggest that anyone send anybody to a bar to test this way of thinking. But, I do want to suggest that our primary purpose is to stay sober and to help other alcoholics to achieve sobriety, and I know that in the past 25 years, or so, A.A. has been flooded with people from the REHAB facilities and protecting them from a drink is the purpose of rehab, but when they arrive in A.A. it shouldn't change what we know works long term. I must be careful not to let my own ambition cloud my judgment on this important issue.

I know that this misconception will be with us for a while but I also know that the Big Book, and the 12X12 will not change, and I also know that we all grow up a little in the program and as we do we patiently realize that the Big Book and 12X12 are wise beyond our comprehension. Understanding the message in those excerpts is the more unselfish and mature way to help the alcoholic who suffers.

We are not snake oil salesmen. We can't give away something we haven't got. Reading these pages to a newcomer would be a good way to explain the true nature of his malady.

THE BUFFALO PLAN

This is the first of two articles describing, 693 Ellicott and The Terrace House.

The need for an enlightened program to help the homeless man, who may or may not be an alcoholic, had been long felt in the City of Buffalo. The situation was brought to a head by the decision of Erie County to close the lodging house better known as the "Big E". The pressure of the closing was first felt by the City Court. Accordingly Chief Judge John Ryan called together a group of interested citizens to plan an intelligent attack on the problem.

Under the guidance of the late John Van Allen, many meetings were held. Discouraging obstacles had to be overcome. Then Frank Sedita, one of the original members of the Van Allen group, who had been on the City Court Bench, became Mayor. He appointed an advisory committee to the Mayor and charged it with the responsibility of developing a program. Later, members of the committee visited the facilities at Rochester. Questions were asked, letters written and visits to facilities in other communities were made. On the basis of this experience, a plan was evolved. They would have a Men's Service Center, with a Half-Way House to back it up.

The problem of finding an available location seemed impossible. Many sites were visited. The Clinic at 693 Ellicott Street became available. While it had been planned that in the natural sequence of events, the Men's Service Center would be the

first to start, it was not to be.

On March 1, 1961 the city leased, with an option to buy, 693 Ellicott Street to be a "Half-Way House." It was well suited for their needs but was in great need of redecorating. This was done. With the acquisition of the necessary furniture, a director and an assistant, the 'Half-Way House' was becoming a reality. On May 16, 1961 the advisory committee, an official agency of the City of Buffalo by ordinance, became effective. The Committee, known as The Mayor's Committee on Human Rehabilitation, serves without compensation. To it the Mayor has appointed leading members of the community who have a special interest and competence in the problem of alcoholism as a community challenge. Buffalo's Half-Way House opened its doors on Fathers Day, June 18, 1961. The first official meeting of the committee was held on Wednesday, June 21. The first residents were accepted on that day and 693 Ellicott came into being.

## THE BUFFALO PLAN

### Continued From Last Issue

#### HOW THEY OPERATE

In the early fall of 1961 the Board of Education made available old School No. 2 on Lower Terrace to the Mayor and his committee to be used as a Men's Service Center. Again the problem of redecorating, obtaining furniture and staff was presented. The Service Center, now known as "Terrace House" was dedicated Saturday, November 4. Men were first housed on November 30, 1961.

The plan was and still is that "Terrace House" be a haven for employable homeless men. Residents are required to pay a nominal charge of 75¢ a day in return for shower facilities, a locker and a clean bed. Arrangements have been made with the County Welfare Department so that the men are furnished adequate meals. The men are expected to seek employment each day and to be cooperative. Since basic and common problems of most of the residents are alcoholism, an opportunity to start a rehabilitation program is offered. Recognizing their limitations, the committee encouraged the establishment of active A.A. groups. These groups now meet three times a week, and can always use plenty of support. If the Director sees rehabilitation possibilities in a resident of the "Terrace House," he may recommend that he be considered for "693", the Half-Way House.

"693" is a residence for men with an admitted alcoholic problem. To be a resident, he must be sober, a resident of the City of Buffalo, of employable physical condition and, above all, have a desire to better himself. All prospective applicants are screened by members of the Mayor's Committee. At "693" the man is given a room to share with another. Good meals are served in a homelike atmosphere. The men are encouraged to attend A.A. meetings, three of which are held at "693" weekly. The Director, thru group talks and individual attention, helps the men to surmount the problem of returning to society. A weekly fee of \$15.00 is charged each man. He is expected to sustain this obligation as soon as he is established in a paying job. This discourages the "free loader" and is

the first step on the road back to social responsibility. As the need arises, the Director will refer individuals to the services of other agencies in the community to care for their special needs. It is the goal of the committee to give the men, some recently released from hospitals or penal institutions, a chance in a homelike environment to re-establish themselves in society as productive citizens. They are set up as a home for admitted alcoholics and not an alcoholism clinic.

Buffalo is indeed fortunate to have "Terrace House" and "693". It is also fortunate that under the administration of our present Mayor, the Honorable Chester Kowal, the Buffalo plan is receiving continuing support and encouragement.

Both "Terrace House" and "693" need our continued attendance at all meetings. If you have not attended these meetings, may we suggest you do so this month.



## Jimmy B: The Man Who Helped So Many Into Our Fellowship

Jim, aka "Jimmy" B's sobriety date was June 15, 1938. He did not come into the AA fellowship then as a glowing, clearly surrendered newcomer, simply ready to do whatever anyone said, or go wherever he was led by elder members. His first sobriety date had been January of that year, and for months after that, he looked like New York AA's primary problem! His own main problem had seemed to be "this God business," and he had stayed loudly insistent about it. He had soon drifted away from the other early AA's, tragically relapsed, but thankfully made it back. He stayed sober from that June on, and the contributions he made to Alcoholics Anonymous are still very much alive, even growing, today.

The contribution that maybe most, if not all, AA members have been helped by: his input on some crucial wording in the Big Book. There was definite disagreement about how to present the "God" aspect of the program, with Fitz M and others on the side of a strongly religious message, Bill W in favor of compromise, and Hank P, for one, hoping for a more inclusive message. Jimmy also supported more inclusiveness, and his voice helped with Bill's wording. The phrase "God as we understood Him" came to be used twice in the 12 Steps, complemented by other statements in the Big Book, like "When, therefore, we speak to you of God, we mean your own conception of God," on page 47. With those words, hope and help became available for alcoholics of any and all belief systems.

In many other people, that kind of great contribution might have been the final one. But in 1940, Jimmy helped get the first AA groups started in 2 different cities: Philadelphia and Baltimore. Philadelphia was the first, in February. Jim moved there with a recently published Big Book and the need for, as he put it, "other alcoholics to work and play with." Only 8 weeks later, the new group had 50 members. And only weeks after that, he was sitting in the first group in Baltimore, that he had worked with another Jim, Jim R, on getting going. That group, too, put down roots and began to grow. By sharing his experience and the Big Book that his contribution helped shape, Jimmy had brought help that spread, and continues to, in both cities and beyond.

So in his first year of sobriety, he had made immensely important contributions that mostly involved face to face communication. After that, he made more through writing. He wrote the first known history of Alcoholics Anonymous--a short document with a limited scope that, nonetheless, set an important precedent. And by the time of the 1955 International Convention, which Bill W used to frame our history for AA Comes of Age, his story, "The Vicious Cycle," was in the Big Book. There, he got to share about his part in "God as we understood Him," and his experience with the life-saving power of our fellowship.

When Jimmy B passed in 1974, just a couple of years after Bill W, he had been sober well over 30 years. And maybe we can take it as a lasting statement about the power of AA friendships, of how we sober drunks belong together, that his grave is only feet away from that of Fitz M.

## Step Six

*"Were entirely ready to have God remove all these defects of character."*

“THIS is the Step that separates the men from the boys.” So declares a well-loved clergyman who happens to be one of A.A.’s greatest friends. He goes on to explain that any person capable of enough willingness and honesty to try repeatedly Step Six on all his faults—*without any reservations whatever*—has indeed come a long way spiritually, and is therefore entitled to be called a man who is sincerely trying to grow in the image and likeness of his own Creator.

### Twelve Spiritual Principles (Virtues)



The office was recently contacted by a long-timer who pointed out that the following article provides a list of spiritual **virtues** (not principles) that originated from a plaque which was sold years ago and may originally came from a Grapevine article or other AA newsletter. It is known in the rooms of AA that the spiritual principles are the Twelve Steps. To be thorough, the 36 principles are the Twelve Steps, Twelve Traditions and Twelve Concepts.

There are many different spiritual virtue lists that refer to the Twelve Steps which have been printed by other AA's over the years. Although used by many AA members, they are not Conference Approved and the origin of these lists are unknown.

Bill W. considered each step to be a spiritual principle in and of itself. However, particularly in the 12 & 12, he outlined the spiritual principles behind each step. Some of them seem like common sense, but understand going into the exercise that reading these principles and actually *practicing them in your day-to-day lives* are two entirely different things (and that the latter requires vigilance and willingness).

- 1. HONESTY** – Fairness and straight forwardness of conduct: adherence to the facts.
- 2. HOPE** – To expect with desire; something on which hopes are centered.
- 3. FAITH** – Complete confidence; belief and trust.
- 4. COURAGE** – Firmness of mind and will in the face of extreme difficulty; mental or moral strength to withstand fear.
- 5. INTEGRITY** – The quality or state of being complete or undivided; soundness.
- 6. WILLINGNESS** – Prompt to act or respond; accepted and done of choice or without reluctance.
- 7. HUMILITY** – Not proud or haughty; not arrogant or assertive; a clear and concise understanding of what we are, followed by a sincere desire to become what we can be.
- 8. LOVE** – Unselfish concern that freely accepts another in loyalty and seeks his good to hold dear.
- 9. DISCIPLINE** – Training that corrects, molds, or perfects the mental faculties or moral character; to bring under control; to train or develop by instruction.
- 10. PATIENCE/PERSEVERANCE** – Steadfast despite opposition or adversity; able or willing to bear; to persist in an understanding in spite of counter influences.
- 11. AWARENESS** – Alive and alert; vigilance in observing.
- 12. SERVICE** – A helpful act; contribution to the welfare of others; useful labor that does not produce a tangible commodity.

As a quick introduction, let me explain what Archives does. We also have a vast amount of historical AA pictures from conventions, fellowship gatherings as well as other AA events.

We believe we have an incredibly comprehensive catalogue of our history. The best part is that it's all available for those who are curious to learn more about our program and groups. Also upon request, we will also be at your home group's events (anniversary meetings, group anniversaries) with a display of materials.

Our committee members actively train with other archivists (locally and at national events) to learn best practices to employ in safeguarding our incredibly important history. We also host an annual Archives breakfast showcasing our vast collection annually which also includes a high profile AA speaker. This isn't free. We spend as much money as we receive through the seventh tradition and from ticket sales to the annual breakfast.

That being said – we need help from your homegroup and any willing members. Please consider this when appropriating funds for GSA, GSO and Central office. We are a separate committee with autonomy. Our very existence relies on the seventh tradition and volunteer support. We're always looking for new members too. This is an excellent way to learn more about our program as well as be of service to our program.




