We Take for Granted our Continued Unity as a Movement – But Should We?

Tradition Ten – An Essay by Bill W.; September 1948

To most of us, Alcoholics Anonymous has become as solid as the Rock of Gibraltar. We like to believe that it will soon be as well-known and just as enduring as that historic landmark. We enjoy this pleasant conviction because nothing has yet occurred to disturb it; we reason that we must hang together or die. Hence we take for granted our continued unity as a movement.

But should we? Though God has bestowed upon us great favors, and though we are bound by stronger ties of love and necessity than most societies, it is prudent to suppose that automatically these great gifts and attributes shall be ours forever? If we are worthy, we shall probably continue to enjoy them. So the real question is, how shall we always be worth of our present blessings?

Seen from this point of view, our AA Traditions are those attitudes and practices by which we may deserve, as a movement, a long life and a useful one. To this end, none could be more vital than our Tenth Tradition, for it deals with the subject of controversy – serious controversy.

On the other side of the world, millions have died even recently in religious dissension. Other millions have died in political controversy. The end is not yet. Nearly everybody in the world has turned reformer. Each group, society, and nation is saying to the other, "You must do as we say, or else." Political controversy and reform by compulsion have reached an all-time high. And eternal, seemingly, are the flames of religious dissension.

Being like other men and women, how can we expect to remain forever immune from these perils? Probably we shall not. At length, we must meet them all. We cannot flee from them, nor ought we try. If these challenges do come, we shall, I am sure, go out to meet them gladly and unafraid. That will be the acid test of our worth.

Our best defense? This surely lies in the formation of a Tradition respecting serious controversy so powerful that neither the weakness of persons nor the strain and strife of our troubled times can harm Alcoholics Anonymous. We know that AA must continue to live, or else many of us and many of our fellow alcoholics throughout the world will surely resume the hopeless journey to oblivion. That must never be.

As though by some deep and compelling instinct, we have thus far avoided serious controversies. Save minor and healthy growing pains, we are at peace among ourselves. And because we have thus far adhered to our sole aim, the whole world regards us favorably.

May God grant us the wisdom and fortitude ever to sustain an unbreakable unity.

John's Question to Me

Dad opens my bedroom door. I'm passed out on top of the covers with last night's cloths on. My side window is wide open from me crawling in a few hours ago. The birds are chirping outside on a nice sunny Saturday morning. Dad says, "Get the hell up! You're not staying out all night then sleeping all day! Jesus, Tom, it smells like a brewery in here. What the hell? If you had some willpower and maybe a hobby you wouldn't be such a damn drunk!" Then he slams my door and yells, "I need you outside in 5 minutes! We're painting the shed today!"

I roll over. Will power! I think. What the hell? And hobbies? I got tons of hobbies! Well, maybe not all legal ones...

Many years later I looked back at that question my dad asked about will power. Well, I found out that will power is great for eating a whole chocolate cake, but when it comes to drinking alcohol, willpower, for me, does not do the trick.

Today, I'm eligible for some great things in my life. I love telling the new guys in our 12 step group that statement. That fact is true for me and anyone else who follows the 12 steps in our program. I wasn't eligible for many good things in life when I was drinking and trying to run my life. I was full of fear, selfish, angry, full of self-pity, resentful, then add booze and drugs! I was a hot mess!

I was stuck there for years! At the end of my drinking days, suicide was a very common thought in my head. I was barely holding on to my window washing job, behind on my rent, always broke, living pay check to pay check, no girl friend. I wasn't much of a catch! I had lost interest in my old hobbies of photography, camping, and hiking in the woods. Life SUCKED! Fear ruled my life. Now that I look back I was just were I needed to be, to be willing to change. I would have to say I hit my bottom. There were only two options in my eyes. The first was suicide, the second was to surrender.

How dark it is before dawn! I had abandoned God! I know he never gave up on me. Today I realize my loving God was by my side in those dark days. I could not stop drinking on my own. I was waiting for something tragic to happen, to force me to stop. God had a plan, just like he has a plan for all of us today. I did get myself in one more jackpot and ended up in jail. That morning I came to out of a blackout and I surrendered. I got on my knees and said a short simple prayer: *God, please help me*!

The next day I walked down the steps of a church to an AA meeting. Little did know at the time it was the greatest event of my life. I was 31 years old when I got sober. It was the spring of 1997. I had dug myself in quite the hole, I was barely holding on to my job, driving a shitty little pick up truck, no girl friend, only a few friends that would still talk to me.

Early on in my journey to sobriety my sponsor, John, asked me a question. He said, "Tom, list three things you want in your new life." I said it would be nice to have my own little apartment, maybe a reliable pickup truck, and a girlfriend would be great. John said, "That's great, Tom. Not unrealistic. If you put the work into staying sober and seek God's will, help others, you can have that and more." Then John said, "I think God has a much bigger plan for you."

Little did I know but God was orchestrating quite the come back for me. Through the 12 step program I was shown how selfish I was, how unreliable I was, and how I hurt my parents and siblings. John helped me see how I affected people in a negative way in my drinking years. He helped me make a list of all the people I needed to make amends to. He also helped me look at situations in different ways. John helped mold me into the man *God intended me to be*, before I polluted myself with alcohol and drugs. Lucky he did not point out all my faults all at once. I probably would have been overwhelmed and gotten drunk, thinking what a *idiot* I was.

I was fed all this knowledge in bite size nuggets so I could digest it slowly. Back in the day, I used to say, "I'm just doing my own thing. I'm not bothering you; don't bother me!" When I made amends to my mom, I figured she would go easy on me, and for the most part she did. Mom opened my eyes to some fakes. I showed up with a 3x5 index card with my bad deeds written down. I talked about how I demolished her favorite car, how I stole money from her purse, and embarrassed her when the cops pulled in our driveway looking for me. Then I said, "Are there any other ways I harmed you that I have not mentioned?"

Mom looked at me and said, "You used to worry me sick when you would stay out all night –never calling, when you were in your early teens!" Then mom told me a story how she had to lie to her mom, my grandmother, when she came from Albany for her annual visit. Good old Tommy stayed out all night partying and never made it home in the morning. Mom lied to her mom and said I slept over at a friend's house when she had no idea were I was.

Mom told me one last thing that really hit home. She told me she only got a good night sleep when I was in rehab or in a hospital —She could rest well knowing I was in a safe place. Damn! I thought I was just doing my own thing!

Today I try to stay humble, I've come to realize that I'm just a spoke in a big huge wheel-by myself I'm weak –I can't navigate the trials and hardships life throws at me. Together with God by my side, other believers, and my support group, I can get through anything.

Back to the title of this story, John's Question to Me. *God had a bigger, better plan for me!* Today I own my own home, drive a new truck, was married, and have a beautiful 16 year old daughter. Today I'm a free man. I can walk anywhere on this great Earth.





Central Committee Minutes May 7th, 2023

The meeting opened at 7:00 PM by Chairperson Dave with a moment of silence followed by the Responsibility Declaration and the Serenity Prayer. Volunteers read the Preamble by Brooks. The Purpose of Central Committee by Jan, and The 12 Traditions was read by Teresa. Bernie presented on the Fifth Tradition. John from

the Grove Group will present in June on the Sixth Tradition.

A motion to accept the April meeting minutes as presented was made and accepted.

Reports:

Envelope System: Pat reported \$1357 taken last month and that new members are needed.

<u>Steering Committee:</u> Steering Committee Member Jesse nothing new to report at this time. We currently have zones 2,7, and 8 open.

Financial Report: April; our Starting Checkbook balance was \$39,646.44. We took in \$4,641.46 (which is **down**) in Contributions from Groups and individuals. The Envelope System took in: \$1,357.00. Literature, Tax & shipping came to \$791.42 (which is **down**). New Frontiers Subscriptions was \$10.00. Joint meeting (Central Committee) was \$41.00.In Income (+) \$503.02 was added to our income \$503.02 from Paychex taxes collected. Our new Payroll Company will be subtracting this when they do our 1st quarter taxes. Total income of \$**7,343.90.**

Our expenses totaled \$5,930.16 (which is **down**). This means, we took in **\$1,413.74 more** than our expenses this month. **YTD we are down \$3,999.85 less than our expenses!!!!** Final checkbook balance is \$41,060.18.

<u>Corrections</u> beginning balance was \$3,286.60. No Income. A \$3.00 Bank Fee, for a balance of <u>\$3,289.60</u>.

<u>Treatment</u> beginning balance was \$734.10. Contribution's totaled \$177.00, Literature was \$9.50, a \$3.00 bank fee for a final balance of \$898.60.
